Cantor's Corner

ou shall each revere his mother and his father, and keep My Sabbaths: I the Lord am your God." (Ex. 19:3)

Over the past 10 years, my 87-year-old mother has been deteriorating in her mental capacity due to dementia. During that time, I have watched her go from one who was independent to one who is now totally dependent on others for her daily

activities in life. This is how life is....when we are born, our parents nurture us to maturity and when we grow old, we hope our children or others will be there for when we are ready to depart this world.

Growing up, I watched my parents take care of my grandparents financially, physically, and spiritually. They set the example of how to live a life full of love, accommodation, and hard work for our family and our extended family. It is a special job to be able to take care of our elderly. They can be difficult, and they can be loving, sometimes all in the same hour!

The word "tira'u," meaning "shall revere," is in the plural referring to both men and women (Kiddushin 30b). When we honor our parents we honor Hashem. We know this because the same language is used when we are commanded to "revere Hashem your God and you shall serve Him." In turn, we revere our parents at the same level as we revere Hashem (Kiddushin 30b).1

When one disrespects a parent, one disrespects Hashem. As a parent, we generally do not tolerate a child being disrespectful and we, in turn, help that child understand what he/she did and provide corrective action (sometimes punishment, depending on the parents' style, and sometimes a teachable moment). We do not do this just for our own ego. This movement towards



understanding provides a path toward doing the right thing in life and, in so doing, that child honors Hashem.

In Kedoshim, what does it really mean to be "Holy" and to honor God? In Midrash Va-Yikra Rabbah many variations on the theme appear. Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai describes "holy or holiness" as a "sense of justice" as in a quote from Isaiah that "the Lord of hosts is exalted through justice." Rabbi Judah thinks that holiness means distinctive, saying, "The distinction You (God) conferred in Your world is eternal." Rabbi Levi relates Holy to the "uniqueness" of the Land of Israel. Because we are B'Tzelem Elohim, in God's image, Rabbi Levi quotes God as saying to the Jewish people: "My children, as I am separate, so you be separate; as I am holy, so you be holy."2

Ultimately, my "job" as clergy and yours is to meet, friends, family, and relatives, and others, at whatever level of "Holiness" they are in. When we assist others in "perpetuating the values and learning of our ancient heritage," which include ma'asim tovim, tzedakah, justice, levels of observance of Shabbat, and supporting our Jewish community, we help move towards Holiness. As we travel in time towards Shavu'ot, may we all warrant being Holy!

A Message from the President

uring a vacation in Amsterdam and the Netherlands, I thought I would be inspired to write something about the Anne Frank House or some other Jewish interest story. We did visit several Jewish places including the Jewish History Museum with mementoes from hundreds of years ago and The Amsterdam Portuguese Sephardic Synagogue completed in 1675. This was one of the largest and richest Jewish communities in Europe during the <u>Dutch Golden Age</u>, and their very large synagogue reflected this. The synagogue remains an active place of worship today.

These are places you'll find throughout Europe stating that Jewish people were once here or an old structure once stood on this site.

But there's more to my story....

We visited our friends who are living in a city called Eindhoven about an hour and half from Amsterdam. This is where the Philips Company began their





light bulb production in the late 1890's and today is the hi-tech center of development for many products. They have invented and manufactured products from



lighting, hospital x-ray machines, cassette tapes, compact CDs, appliances, TV's, Norelco brand shavers, etc. There's also a museum in the town that shows all the product line and a video of the history of the company.

The video talks about Frits Philips who opened his factory making electronics in the 1920s, especially radios. Since Jews were a significant number of people, they were hired to manufacture the radios for the Philips company during WWII.

Taking charge of the company that had begun producing light bulbs, he was the one who provided them with the light they needed to survive the war.


As the rest of his family fled to the United States after the Nazis occupied the Netherlands, Philips said it was his duty to stay behind and help out, both the company



and his workers, of which a significant portion were Jewish. They were helping out the German war effort, but their lives were also being saved.

"Like Oskar Schindler, Frits used the argument that the Jews he employed were indispensable to company production," wrote editors John Forrer and Conor Seyle in "The Role of Business in the Responsibility to Protect."

A member of the "personal evangelist" Christian



movement Oxford Group, Philips segregated the Jews from the rest of the workers, giving them simple tasks as most had no technical background. He even provided for them food rations, which became known as "Philips-prak," Philips' mash, based on a Dutch dish of soup, mashed potatoes, carrots and meat.

Fearing that the company's low production rates would hasten the deportation of the Jewish workers, Philips came up with a scheme to pay the German authorities \$2,000,000 for 400 exit visas. The plan, however, never came to fruition.

A devout Christian, Philips did manage to establish a workshop in the Vught concentration camp, once again convincing the authorities of the importance of the Jewish inmates' work to the Nazi war effort, sparing hundreds of Jewish lives.

At the same time, another member of the Philips Company played a major role in helping to save Jewish people. Dutch businessman Jan Zwartendijk, who had become the acting Dutch consul in Kaunas in 1940, began giving out passes stating that no entry visa was required to arrive in the Dutch colonies in the Caribbean.

The Soviets had agreed to the let the Jewish refugees pass with the Dutch permit, but only if it was accompanied by a Japanese transit visa, which is where Japanese-Consul Chuine Sugihara stepped in, giving out more than 2,000 of those

visas.

As a result of their joint efforts, some 6,000 Jewish people were able to escape Europe.

Frits and Zwartendijk didn't work together, and the Philips president wasn't even aware of Zwartendijk's actions until 1997.

In Vught, Philips had segregated 496 Jews for his workshop. He could not delay their deportation indefinitely, but of those deported 382 survived.

He was "a successful businessman who was more interested in the common good than the corporate coffers," wrote Gregory Crouch in a "New York Times" obituary.

On July 18, 1995, Yad Vashem recognized Frederik J. Philips as Righteous Among the Nations. He died December 5, 2005.



t the end of the fifteenth century, the Spanish Inquisition forced many Jews to flee the country. The most adventurous among them took to the high seas as freewheeling outlaws. In ships bearing names such as Prophet Samuel, Queen Esther, and Shield of Abraham, they attacked and plundered the Spanish fleet while forming alliances with other European powers to ensure the safety of Jews living in hiding.

(Tips will be collected prior to departure)


June of 2019 is coming fast so make your commitment to come to Israel and enjoy this trip of a lifetime!


