Israel.” We the people of Israel find understanding, purpose, belonging, and holiness in the text and in our community. The Torah is not a history book. It is a book that provides us with purpose and “gives meaning to our lives.”

It’s your turn to create something new in the world. Each life that produces G’milut Chasadim, Acts of Lovingkindness, performs mitzvot, acting like Tzadikim in our care for others, and by “delighting” in the Torah, proves and justifies God’s creation!

In regard to **Shabbat**, we have a 25-hour period where we shut down the outside world and focus on family, friends, and Torah. However, if you are unable to celebrate the entire time, why not start with a shorter time period. You decide what that time frame is. For that period, turn off the cell phone, email, and electronics. Spend time with your family and have a conversation. How about a visit to Shul on Friday night and or Saturday morning? You might really enjoy it... and it is habit forming!

Remember, words can create and words can destroy. In this day and age, we must be careful about what we say and how we say it. However, we must take time to study and “digest” words of Torah. If you have not tried out the Torah study on the 3rd Saturday of the month, please come and try it. Put it on your “bucket list”. You will not be disappointed. 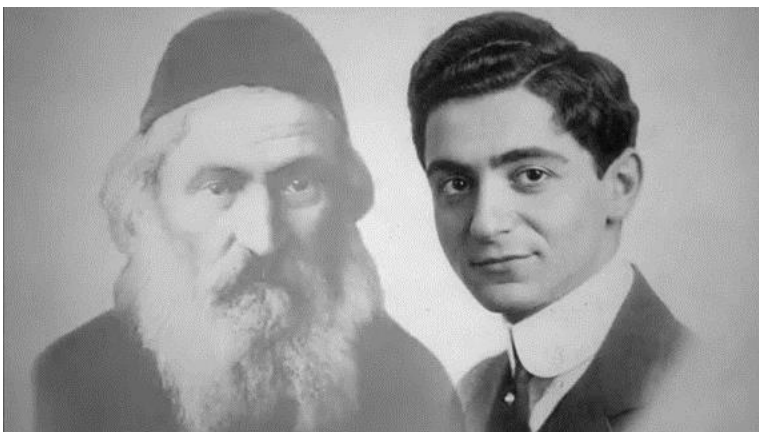

President Message

I thought to do a story on Irving Berlin who was famous for writing classic American songs such as "White Christmas," "God Bless America," "Puttin' on the Ritz," and "There's No Business Like Show Business." Known as the King of Tin Pan Alley, he wrote more than 1000 songs that appeared in movies, TV shows, and Broadway musicals. This is in honor of what would be Irving Berlin's 130th birthday.

Israel Isidore Baline was born May 11, 1888 in Mohilev, Russia. In the early 1890s, Berlin's parents moved their family of eight (Israel, who was 5 at the time, was the youngest of six). His father was a *shochet* (one who kills kosher animals as prescribed by Jewish religious laws) who was also the cantor in the synagogue. His family moved to New York in 1893 to escape the pogroms in Russia.



He went by Izzy in America in an attempt to assimilate, and when his first composition was printed, it bore the name "I. Berlin." Berlin allowed a rumor to circulate that it was a printing error that created his pen name, but biographers tend to note that he chose it because it closely resembled his birth name, but sounded less ethnic. In 1911, he legally made the change from Izzy Baline to Irving Berlin.

At the age of eight, he took to the streets of the Lower East Side of New York City to help support his mother and family after his father had died. In the early 1900s he worked as a singing waiter in many restaurants and started writing songs. His first published hit was "Marie From Sunny Italy." His successes continued through two years.

Despite Berlin's incredible songwriting success, he was neither classically trained nor educated in music theory. He only knew how to play the piano in F sharp, so in order to write songs that didn't all

sound the same, he bought transposing keyboards. These special keyboards changed the key, allowing him to play the same notes but produce different sounds. Berlin also paid music secretaries who notated and transcribed his music.

Berlin was married for only a year to Dorothy Goetz, who died from typhoid contracted while on their honeymoon in Cuba in 1913. He married Ellin Mackay in 1926. She was the daughter of Clarence Mckay, president of Postal Telegraph Company, a leading Catholic layman who opposed the wedding. The Berlins had three daughters.



In World War I, he wrote the musical *Yip, Yip, Yaphank*, which was produced by the men of Camp Upton. In this musical, the big hit song was "Oh, How I Hate to Get Up in the Morning," which reflected Berlin's aversion to rising early. This musical raised more than \$150,000 to build a service center at Camp Upton.

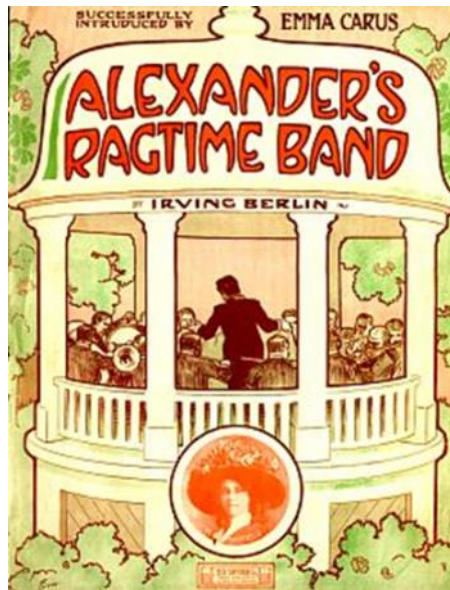
On Armistice Day, 1938, he introduced "God Bless America," which was sung by Kate Smith. This song threatened to replace the national anthem because of its patriotism and popularity.

In World War II, he wrote the musical *This is the Army*, which raised \$10 million for the Army Emergency Relief. His hits in this musical were "This is the Army, Mr Jones" and "I Left My Heart at the Stage Door Canteen." He also wrote other patriotic songs such as "Any Bonds Today?," "Arms for the Love of America," and "Angels of Mercy" for the American Red Cross.

Berlin was prolific: He wrote more than 900 songs, 19 musicals and the scores of 18 movies. Some of his songs that have become classics include "There's No Business Like Show Business," "Easter Parade". He also wrote "White Christmas" which is a 1942 Irving Berlin song reminiscing about an old-fashioned Christmas setting. The version sung by Bing Crosby is the world's best-selling single with estimated sales in excess of **100 million copies** worldwide. He is the top money maker among songwriters in America. In 1924, songwriter Jerome Kern observed "Irving Berlin has no place in American music. He is American music."

Berlin supported Jewish charities and organizations and donated many dollars to worthwhile causes. He was honored in 1944 by the National Conference of Christians and Jews for "advancing the aims of the conference to eliminate religious and racial conflict." Five years later, he was honored by the New York YMHA as one of "12 outstanding Americans of the Jewish faith."

It was a fun time for everyone.

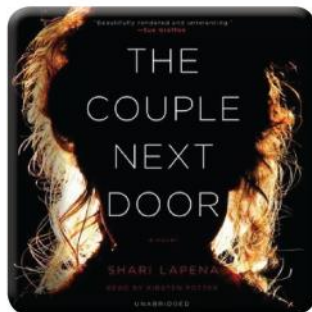

On February 18, 1955, President Eisenhower presented him with a gold medal in recognition of his services in composing many patriotic songs for the country. Earlier, Berlin assigned the copyright for "God Bless America" to the God Bless America Fund, which has raised millions of dollars for the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Berlin's World War I doughboy uniform and many of his original patriotic scores are on display in the Jewish War Veterans Museum in Washington, D.C.



Irving Berlin died on September 22, 1989, at the age of 101.

Following a gala 100th birthday celebration concert at Carnegie Hall, Morton Gould, president of ASCAP, said that "Irving Berlin's music will last not for just an hour, not for just a day, not for just a year, but always." Not bad for a poor immigrant who had only two years of formal schooling and who never learned to read or write music!

Her words of encouragement and amazement were evident as "CBS is known as 'the little shul who could', has now become 'the little shul who DID'."

Referencing the support our synagogue has for Israel, through JNF Trees, many synagogues 10 times our size purchase one grove over a 10 year timeframe, yet we have purchased a grove of 1,000 trees every year for five (5) consecutive years. It is our understanding, that the most recent grove will be planted in the Gaza area.

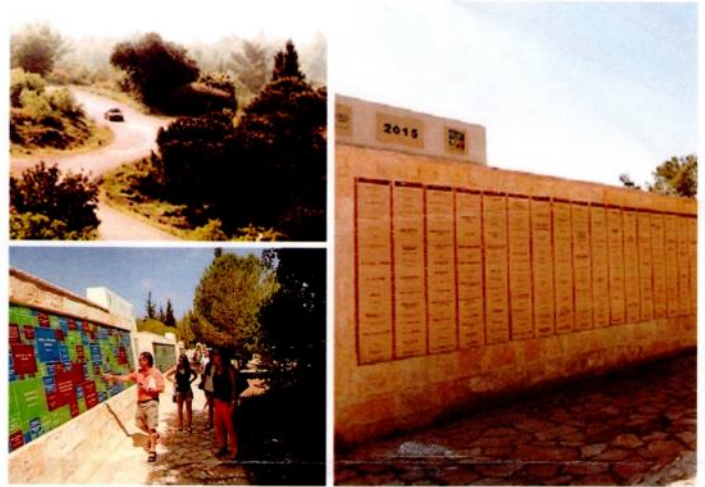

When Bruce Saperston was in High School, he dreamed of becoming a composer. As an undergraduate music major, he composed music for numerous university theatrical productions and a professional production. However, shortly after graduation, he began to follow a new career path.

As an aspiring songwriter/composer, Bruce took a job in an institution for individuals with intellectual and behavioral challenges. While working there, he observed the seemingly miraculous effects of music on some of the residents. He read about the relatively new profession of music therapy and became fascinated by the ways in which music could be scientifically applied in the treatment of individuals with various disabilities. He fell in love with music therapy.

During the next 15 years he became a Board Certified Music Therapist, completed a Masters Degree and a PhD in Special Education at the University of Texas in Austin, and pioneered music therapy interventions for a variety of populations including individuals on the Autism Spectrum, and children and adults with intellectual, behavioral and physical challenges.

Dr. Saperston then became a Professor of Music Therapy at Utah State University, where he also served as Chair of the Department of Music. He became internationally renowned as a clinician, author, and researcher, providing presentations and workshops in Asia and Europe. However, while he loved his work in music therapy, he yearned to have time to fulfill his dream of composing music.

Now in retirement, he has been able to combine two of his passions: his love of composing and his spiritual growth. The act of writing liturgical songs is itself prayer to him, as well as fulfilling his great need to compose. Thus far, he has only shared his songs with a few individuals. As he is not primarily a performer, Cantor Bruce Shapiro will assist him in presenting his Judaic songs in this premier concert of his works. It is his pathway to fulfilling a dream!

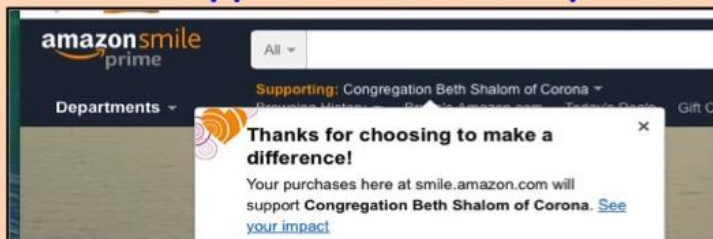

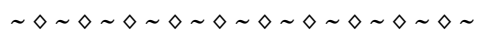

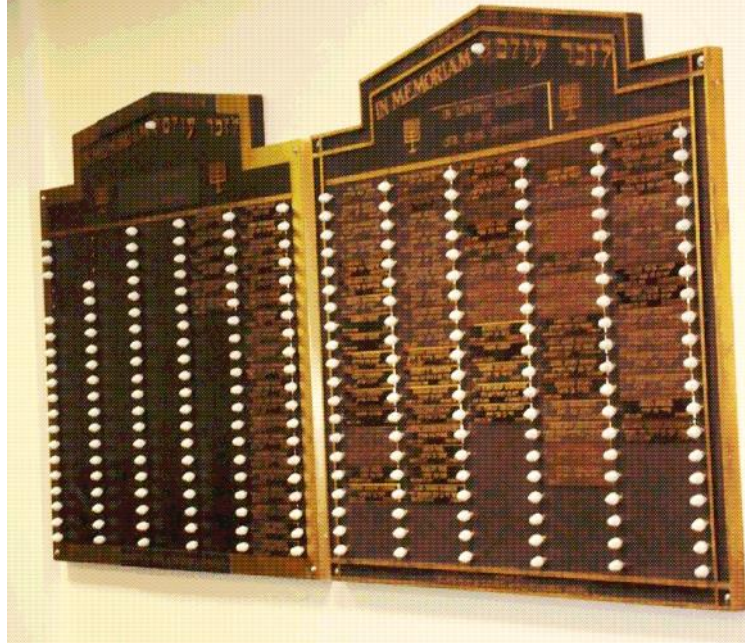
