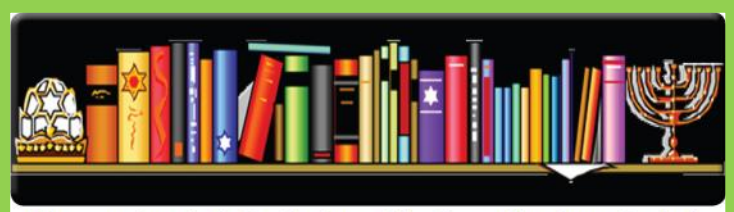

She along with her beloved husband, Stuart, of blessed memory, were instrumental in the formation of Temple Beth Shalom, now known as Congregation Beth Shalom.

President Message

Last week I heard a word which sounded like a Yiddish sounding word and this intrigued me to research the history and commonly used words.



Yiddish A bit of History

It is impossible to pin down exactly where or when Yiddish emerged, but the most widely-accepted theory is that the language came into formation in the 10th century, when Jews from France and Italy began to migrate to the German Rhine Valley. There, they combined the languages they brought with them, together with their new neighbors' Germanic, producing the earliest form of Yiddish. As Jews continued to migrate eastward—a result of the Crusades and the Black Plague—Yiddish spread across Central and Eastern Europe and began to include more elements from Slavic languages. Prior to the Holocaust, there were 11–13 million speakers of Yiddish among 17 million Jews worldwide. 85% of the approximately 6 million Jews who died in the Holocaust were Yiddish speakers, leading to a massive decline in the use of the language. Assimilation following World War II and aliyah, immigration to Israel, further decreased the use of Yiddish both among survivors and among Yiddish-speakers from other countries (such as in the Americas). However, the number of speakers is increasing in Hasidic communities.

So here's a brief glossary of important and commonly used Yiddish words and phrases.

Bissel (bisl): A little bit, as in “I just want to eat a bissel right now.”

Bubbe (bubby): Grandmother

Chutzpah: Nerve, extreme arrogance, brazen presumption, confidence, as in “It took real chutzpah for him to ask for a raise when he kept showing up late for every appointment.”

5. My apologies ahead of time, I will not be there on Friday, May 3 as a prior scheduled event that I must attend. However, come enjoy the service that Cantor Shapiro has planned and will lead. Earlier service, at 6:30pm with Oneg provided by the Jacobs in honor of their children's anniversaries for wedding and bat mitzvah celebrations
6. Cantor returns on Saturday, May 4 for the 10am services.
7. On Friday May 10, I invite all of you to come worship at 7:30pm. Again, we need to continue our lives and prove to those 'haters' that they will not stop us! Our family is hosting the Oneg in celebration of Karen's birthday.

Tragedy hits CA Synagogue!

CBS embraces new safety policies.

Shocked by the reports I found as Passover was concluding, a deranged 19 year old from the San Diego area went into the Chabad center in Poway and fired shots. Ironically, this falls on the 6 month anniversary of the synagogue in Pittsburgh who had a horrific shooting that is tied to Hate Crimes also.

Early reports indicate that long time member, Lori Gilbert–Kaye, jumped in front of the shooter, who had aimed the gun at Chabad Rabbi Yisroel Goldstein. Rabbi Goldstein lost his index finger (attempting to prevent the shooter from wounding and hurting others.)

Our synagogue family joins together in prayer for all those impacted in this hate crime in Poway.

SAFETY AT OUR SYNAGOGUE

Our synagogue Board is continually updating our safety practices. Board member Joan Jacobs is leading these efforts.

On Sunday morning, following Passover, I received a text from Corona Police Chief George Johnstone first to extend condolences to the Jewish people, secondly to share his team have been monitoring and will be involved in protection and planning for our synagogue, to ensure the safety. We are truly blessed to have a proactive team of professionals that serve as first responders.

Last month's issue, of this newsletter, shared the Fire Drill assembly that has been conducted with the Students of our Religious School. CBS Board of Directors have taken the safety of all of our congregants very seriously and

unfortunately in the world we live in today, we do have to adapt and make sure of our surroundings at all times and many of comforts may be altered. Board Member Joan Jacobs has become the 'safety training person' who has delved into several meeting with public safety specialist to ensure CBS continues to be the warm and welcoming shul that so many have enjoyed since its founding in 1968.

New policies for entering the building will require using the door bell system. One of our trained staff of volunteers will be assigned to unlocking and allowing our members to enter.

As these new policies become introduced and changes to our normal process begin, we hope you will embrace these with the understanding of your safety is first and foremost.

We embrace Rabbi Goldstein's comments from the hospital, **"Terror will not win!"** In doing so, we invite all of you to join us for services EVERY Friday night, and especially, during the month of May since we have 5 to attend: May 3, 10, 17, 24 and 31.

Saturday's in May will be May 4 and 18.

May 3 Cantor Bruce Shapiro will be leading services. This is the family service, which begins at 6:30pm, Oneg is sponsored by Joan & Ken Jacobs from 5:45pm until services start. On Saturday, May 4 services begin at 10am with a study session at 9am.

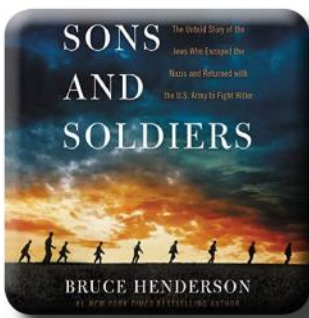

Moving to California was life changing and Dad did his very best to assist teenaged children in leaving their friends and traveling across America to make a new home. A few years later, we tragically lost our mother.

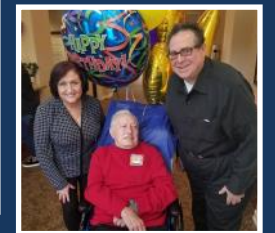
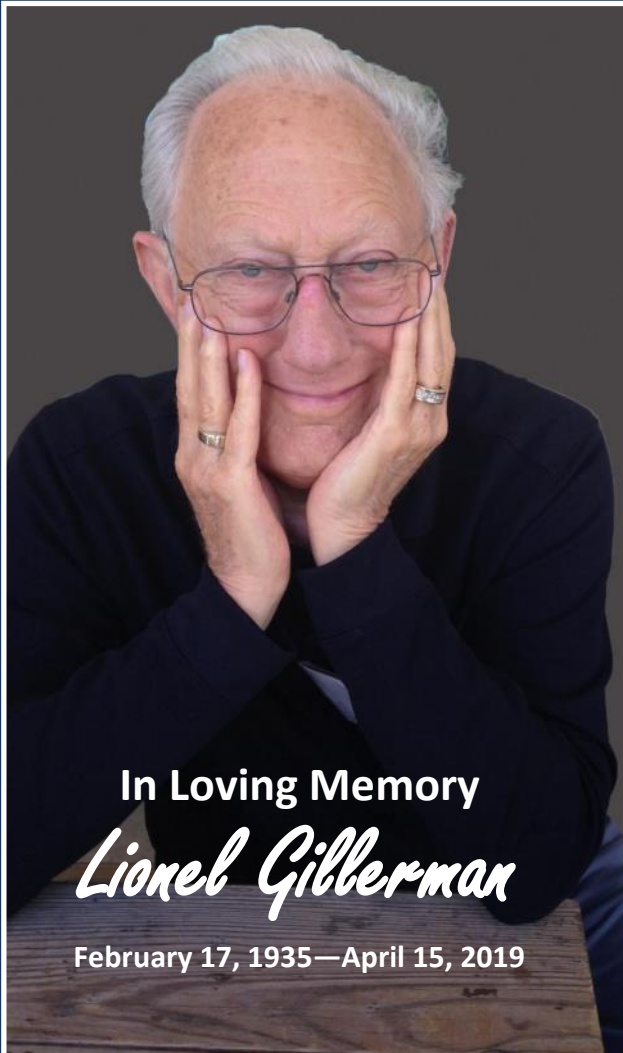
Fortunately, Dad met and married Harriet and they were inseparable since. Dad began a new phase of life, love and happiness.

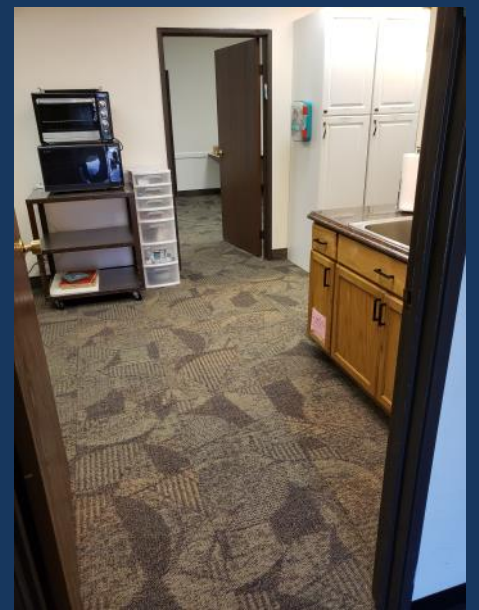

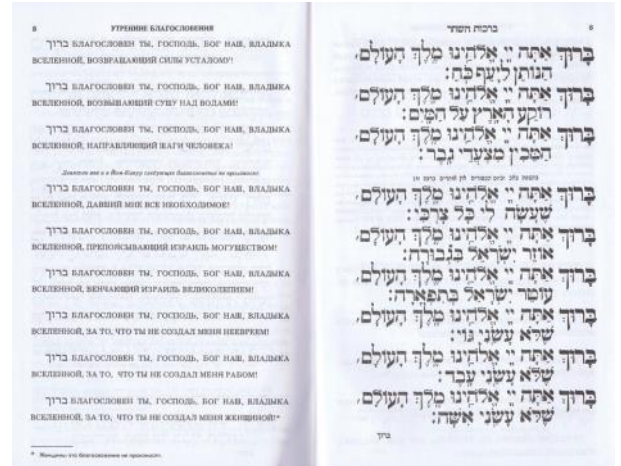

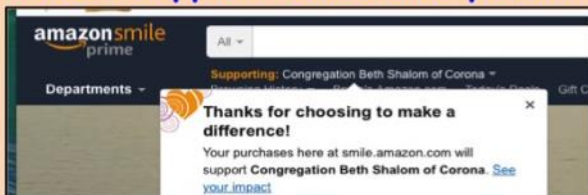

Daven: To pray

Klutz: A clumsy person

Kvell: To experience pride in someone else, typically one's children, as in "David decided to go into oncology, and I'm just kvelling."

Kvetch: To complain, whine or fret, as in "He likes to kvetch at me when we serve kasha varniskes, because he doesn't like it."

Mensch (mentsch): Literally "man," an honorable, decent, stand-up person, as in, "I don't care who you marry, as long as he's a mensch."

Meshuggeneh: Crazy, ridiculous, insane, as in, "He must be meshuggeneh to think he can wear that getup to a funeral." (A related word is *mishegoss*, or craziness.)

Mishpocheh (mishpokhe, mishpucha): Family, or someone who is "like family"

Nosh: To eat or nibble, as in "I'd like something to nosh on before dinner." Can also be used as a noun to mean any kind of food.

Oy vey: An expression of woe, as in "Oy vey, we left the gefilte fish at the grocery store!"

Putz: A jerk, or a self-made fool, but this word literally means penis.

Schlep: To carry or travel with difficulty, as in "We shlepped here all the way from New Jersey."



Schmooze (shmooze): Chat, make small talk, converse about nothing in particular.

Schmuck (shmuck): A jerk, or a self-made fool, but this word literally means penis.

Shande (shanda, shonda): A scandal, embarrassment.

Shmatte: A rag or old garment.

Tachlis: Nuts and bolts, practical, concrete matters.

Tchotchke (tchatchke): Knick-knack, little toy, collectible or giftware.

Tuches (tuckis): Butt, behind, sometimes shortened to tush or tushy.

Zayde (zaide): Grandfather

Here's more...

Yiddish is unparalleled as a darkly comic language of complaint, a way to look on the dark side of life and laugh at it. Developed out of Hebrew and German, Yiddish became its own rich linguistic culture, with a unique mode of expression all its own. Half of those expressions just happen to be insults. From the vast array of Yiddish insults, put downs, lamentations and naughty words, if you have to curse someone, make sure to do it in Yiddish. It just sounds cooler.

I found a couple of phrases that have interesting meanings:

"Abi gezunt dos leben ken men zikh ale mol nemen." Sounds nice in Yiddish, right? Translated it means roughly, "Stay healthy, because you can kill yourself later."

"Lign in drerd un bakn beygl!": A curse meaning "May you lie in the ground and bake bagels." To explain, this curse means that you should burn in hell for all eternity and bake bagels that you may never eat.

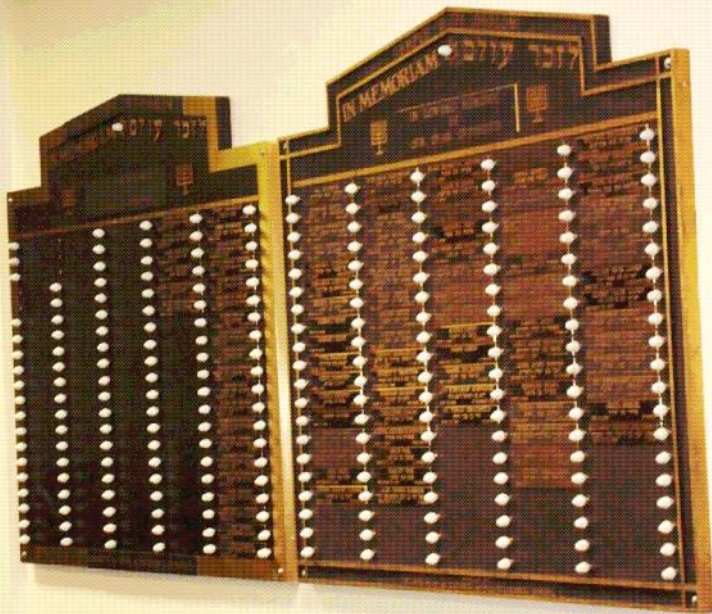
