e are now back from the CBS Israel 2019 trip. A wonderful time and I'm so glad my family went on this trip. So much more appreciation for the land of Israel, people and history that anyone could have imagined. Cantor Bruce talked about our trip, so please take time to read his article and we have several photos included in this publication.



For my article, I wanted to touch on our annual meeting. While we normally cover our synagogue business, I wanted to focus on synagogue security. We introduced Joan Jacobs as our Security Liaison. She has been working very hard, attending webingers and doing attending webingers and doing attending webingers and doing attending webingers and doing



been working very hard, attending webinars and doing much research and is putting together a plan of action for us to follow.

Joan introduced Police Lieutenant Paul Mercado and Sergeant Dan Hatchett, who is a specialist in responses to Active Shooter incidents.

Sergeant Hatchett mentioned that nationwide, the average response time to Priority 1 calls, which are any calls involving life endangerment is 3 minutes. In Corona, response time is1 to 5 minutes. We are very close to a police station, so response time to us



would be on the low end, but they don't know where officers are at any given time.

The main take-away Lieutenant Mercado spoke about is the importance of keeping vigilant for anything that seems out of order.

Congregants had lots of questions regarding our plans and what is already in place and Joan promised they would be kept informed as developments occur. She mentioned that we have a security committee consisting of David Severson, Joel Friedberg and Sam Miller who are helping her with the planning.

Joan mentioned that we are planning to have an armed guard for all services during High Holy days and an extra light at the end of the building has been installed. We are talking with a security company regarding front door cameras, and our



We love having our Pre- and Post-B'nai Mitzvah students lead services, and don't want to leave the rest of you feeling there is no time that you can experience what they do.


Yeah? What's it gonna cost me—\$0 And the hidden monthly fees? - \$0

Beyond the SYNAGOGUE

On Tuesday, May 4th, I attended a quarterly meeting with the City of Corona Police Department and clergy in the City of Corona. It was held at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Surprisingly, Lieutenant Paul Mercado was at the meeting. He is the person who spoke to us at the Congregation meeting the day before. I thought he had done a great job and announced that to those assembled.

The topic for the day was Unmanned Aircraft Aerial Systems – otherwise known as drones. Lieutenant Mercado did the presentation and did just as good a job on it. He emphasized that none of these drones are weaponized. They are used for specific tasks and not just to spy on the neighborhood. They are part of the Corona P.D.s Crime Reduction Strategy. While violent crime is down in Corona, property theft is much higher than it has been in the past.

These aircraft are funded by grants, donations (The Home Depot and Walmart each donated a drone to the police department), and developer impact fees. All drone pilots have to be certified The City of Torrance taught the City of Corona Police Department and they are helping to train other departments.

The cameras have 4,000 pixel resolution and forward-looking infrared, so they can track a suspect day or night. The drones won't replace helicopters. Helicopters can fly farther and faster and the drones are charged only for about 30 minutes. Besides the pilot, a visual observer is used to help direct the flight. The cost is about \$800.00 per hour. There are smaller drones, which are kept in the back of patrol cars. These drones run for about 8 minutes.

The next speaker talked about the use of statistics to try to help reduce crime. There are 4 zones in Corona and the zone commander is responsible for crime in his area. They are measured on response time and use real-time crime statistics to help predict which areas need patrolling.

The third topic was homelessness. There are approximately 766 sheltered homeless and 2045 unsheltered homeless in Riverside County. This is a 21% increase from 2018. Orange County saw a 43% increase. San Diego reported a decrease, but it's suspected that their counting was not valid. Homelessness is at 24.9% in California, which is much higher than other parts of the country. These people are mostly from California. Interviews with homeless in Riverside County revealed that only 26% were from outside the county and 2% from outside the state. Seniors are increasingly becoming homeless. 70% of the homeless are men and 30% women. It's hard to track families that are homeless.

I am impressed with the Corona Police Department. They work hard to walk a fine line between keeping people safe, recognizing privacy needs, and behaving ethically and compassionately.





hey were young Jewish boys who escaped from Nazi-occupied Europe and resettled in America. After the United States entered the war, they returned to fight for their adopted homeland and for the families they had left behind. Their stories tell the tale of one of the U.S. Army's greatest secret weapons.

ons and Soldiers begins during the menacing rise of Hitler's Nazi party, as Jewish families were trying desperately to get out of Europe. Bestselling author Bruce Hendeson captures the heartbreaking stories of parents choosing to send their young sons away to uncertain futures in America, perhaps never to see them again. 

On February 6, 1962, the synagogue was dedicated in the presence of the artist as part of Hadassah's Colden Appiversary Colebration of Hadassah's Golden Anniversary Celebration.

At the special dedication ceremony Chagall stated: "This is my modest fit to the Jewish People who have always dreamt of biblical love, friendship and of peace among all peoples. This is my gift to that people which lived here thousands of years ago

Hadassah is part of the Women's Zionist Organization of America. For over nine decades, Hadassah has extended its hand to all, without regard for race, religion or ethnic origin. People from all the countries in the region turn to
Hadassah for hope and help. They are treated
alongside patients from the Mediterranean Basin, Europe, South America and the United States.

More than a million people are treated each year in over 120 outpatient clinics and one of more than 70 departments and specialized units.


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MASADA




