Cantor's Corner by Cantor Bruce Shapiro

In last months article. I mentioned **Cheshbon HaNefesh!** "Check" please.

A Cheshbon is a bill (like in a restaurant) or a check. Cheshbon HaNefesh is a "check" on how our "nefesh" or "soul" is doing. In other words, an "accounting of the soul" or "What does my life add up to right now?

- 1. In what ways have I made the world better?
- In what ways have I made it worse? 3. How do I affect the lives of others?

4. Are their lives easier or harder because of my behavior?

The questions themselves take us out of the realm of self. We ask not "who or what has been good for me?" but "for whom or what have I been good?" Cheshbon HaNefesh is the beginning of **Teshuyah** (repair/fixing). Each year, during the month of **Elul**, we prepare for this accounting and take the time to repair the wrongs we have done in the prior year. It is hard not to trănsgress, but there is a way to make "real" change. In order to do this, we must take into mind what can be changed, fixed, or repaired (Tikkun). We must remember that we are

accountable to the Holy One (a King perhaps) and this is a difficult concept for many to "wrap their heads around". It is not easy to think that we are accountable to someone or something that has to do with our lives. But, on Rosh Hashana, we have a "real King" to give praise and say thanks to.

I found it interesting that in **Chassidus (aka Chasidism)**, there is no Tikkun Ölam, repairing of the world, but only Tikkun HaNefesh, the fixing of oneself, not others. Along that line, we may think that it's only the **actions** we have taken, and the **speech** we have used. But **thought** can also be included too! We can and must change the thoughts that are in our mind too.

During the month of Elul, we prepare by using the tools we have such as meditation, prayer, relationships, the way we work, eat, relate to others or the way we dress. Rosh Hashana is the deepening of the understanding of who we are in the world. We look for our "purpose" here on earth... Why are we here?

The purpose of living is to free the "sparks" in order to make good in the world. As my teacher Ronni Serr said, "to make a sad song, and make it better". We have the opportunity for Teshuvah, to repair ourselves. In turn, we can help others. We must start with those we have transgressed against individually, saying, "I am sorry and I will do better next year". Then, we address the transgressions we have done before Hashem and ask for forgiveness. These we do as individuals and on the High Holidays as a community.

The Judgement books are now open for review. How will you tip the "scale" of the Book of Life in your favor? **Cheshbon HaNefesh** is the essential prelude to meaningful change. If we approach the process humbly and sincerely, it can provide us with a map for more worthy living.

Adon Olam, Master of the Universe, may we hear the loud call to action of the **Shofar** each weekday during the month of Elul as we say "I am sorry" to those we may have harmed this past year and promise to do better next year. We continue to do Teshuvah for ourselves with the hopes of selfimprovement and an accounting of our actions, speech, and thoughts.

Happy New Year...L'Shana tova tikateivu v'teichatemu! May you be inscribed in the Book of Life for a year of Happiness, Good Health, and Prosperity from the Shapiro Family!

President's Message

Founding of Hadassah

Our recent visit to Israel took us to the Hadassah Hospital in Jerusalem. Here's a brief history of the organization & it's founder.



The founding of Hadassah started on February 24, 1912 when 38 women gathered at Temple Emanu-El in New York City to create a new organization called Daughters of Zion. Under the leadership of Henrietta Szold, they hoped to create "a large organization of women Zionists" devoted to "the promotion of

Jewish institutions and enterprises in Palestine, and the fostering of Jewish ideals." In 1914, Daughters of Zion, was renamed Hadassah: The Women's Zionist Organization of America. Today, Hadassah describes itself as the largest voluntary women's organization and largest Jewish membership organization in the United States.

Dissatisfied by the limited opportunities for women's leadership in the Jewish world and inspired by a 1909 trip to Palestine, Szold was determined to create her own organization where women could lead in practical social service work. Szold organized her group according to strict scientific and business principles. Modeling Hadassah after the National Council of Jewish Women, founded in 1893, she adopted a system of local chapters headed by a national office, and insisted that the organization be focused on social service.

Avoiding religious and political controversy, Hadassah recruited women from all streams of Judaism and reached out to non-Zionists as well as Zionists. Stressing woman-to-woman contact on humanitarian and social feminist grounds, the organization grew quickly. From an initial roster of 38 women, the organization grew to 21,000 members in 34 chapters within its first five years. Today it claims more than 330,000 members.

Hadassah turned to health care for its first projects, sending two nurses in 1913 to create a visiting nurse

service in Palestine. Hadassah nurses established the region's first pediatric and maternity clinics, and helped to eradicate trachoma. Today, Hadassah supports two major medical



centers in Jerusalem, among other endeavors. Active in health and education issues in the U.S. as well as in Israel, Hadassah has also turned to its roots by sponsoring study groups on Jewish and contemporary topics from stem cell research to Israeli women's fiction. Keeping Szold's example before them, Hadassah members continue to show that women can change the Jewish world.



About the founder

The remarkable Henrietta Szold was born in 1860 in Baltimore, Maryland, the child of Rabbi Benjamin Szold and his wife Sophie. A political liberal and a religious traditionalist, Rabbi Szold taught his daughter German, Hebrew, and the Jewish sacred texts to supplement her public school education. In her



teens she began to work as a translator and an editor. She later became a teacher and wrote for a number of Jewish journals.

In 1888 she was chosen to be one of the nine members of the publication committee of the Jewish Publication Society (JPS). The only woman on the committee, she collaborated with Cyrus Adler on a contribution to JPS's first publication, <u>Outlines of Jewish History</u>. She also helped to edit Heinrich

Graetz's classic *History of the Jews*. In 1893 she became executive secretary of the publications committee and, for over two decades, was instrumental in the editing, translating, and publication of some of the most important works in American Judaism.

In 1909 Szold visited Palestine and became intensely involved in the work to reconstruct the Jewish homeland. At the age of 49 she had discovered her vocation. She devoted the rest of her life to Palestine — the promised land. Back in America she founded Hadassah, the Zionist organization for women. Szold had clearly become a "resident" of her adopted homeland. She died in 1945, three years before

the creation of the State of Israel, which she had done so much to make possible.

No visit is complete without seeing the beautiful synagogue within the hospital. It contains twelve stained-glass windows from the famous artist Marc Chagall. Each window depicts a tribe of Israel

and each with its own predominant color scheme, transform the space of the synagogue in Hadassah Hospital – Ein Karem into a dazzling play of light and colors in a way that is profoundly moving for a place of worship. Each window is about 11 feet tall and 8 feet wide. They were completed in 1961. They were on display in Paris, then New York, where record breaking crowds lined up around the block of the Museum of Modern Art to see them. The windows were installed in their permanent home in February 1962.
