The Power of One!

In the Beginning there were just a few families who brought Congregation Beth Shalom into existence. It took one family to ask the question and to ask others to join in to make “nothing” into something and a reality. Over 50 years later,

CBS has grown to approximately 40 plus family units. It is amazing that the “**Little Shul That Can**” exists and has thrived through all economic and political changes. Our goal and mission remain one, a community to share our Jewishness with the same ideals and to help others!

Bereishit provides us with another look at creation and family connections. It teaches us some “To Do’s and some NOT To Do’s”. If you want to look at dysfunction in a family, take a look in Bereishit. First in the creation of the world, Adam and Eve are “kicked out” of the Garden of Eden. Why? Because we are curious? We ask questions? We question everything? Isn’t that the “Jewish Credo”? How did we get here? We are still asking that question!

In **Noach**, G-d stated that after the flood that he would never destroy the world again. Although Hashem may be angry or upset with the Israelites there would always be an opportunity for reconciliation and forward movement. That is an important concept when people don’t agree. We listen, we may not agree, we may get angry, but we listened, we heard, and we learned how the “other” thinks and feels. (Look up Hillel Vs. Shamai).

Recently, Marcy and I were two of several honorees at a “**Power of One**” luncheon in Newport Beach. The luncheon was sponsored by Olive Crest (OliveCrest.com), the organization from where we started fostering our two children. During that time, we learned that there are over 70,000 children in the Foster Care system in California alone. We also learned that this is a worldwide problem.

While we listened to our guest speaker, Jason Weber, National Director of Foster Care Initiatives, tell his story about actually adopting the 5 kids he and his wife fostered, he shared with us a story

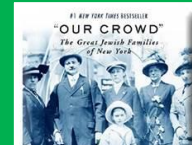
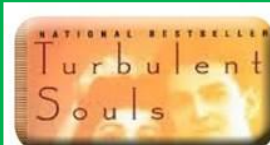
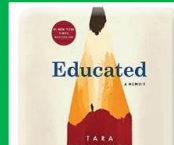

about a town in Iowa. In 1988, a farmer had a problem with his barn flooding. The solution was to move the barn, but it weighed over 8 tons. The farmer's son came up with a way to do it and was able to garner the support of 344 people, a lot of steel reinforcement, and 4000 spectators who watched. Those 344 movers actually walked this barn to a new location where it would not be affected by the heavy rains in that area.

The point of this is to show you the "Power of One" can be an effective way to get something that you want done....done! If you think that you cannot do something, you won't (you can try this with little kids and vegetables!). But, you don't know unless you try!

I ask you to take a look at your life and the lives of those around you. What is it that we can do to make our lives better and the lives of others better? Together, could our parents and their children be calling and visiting our sick or elderly at home or in the hospital? Could we be raising funds for a cause outside of our Shul? Could we adopt a family for Hanukah, Christmas, or Kwanzaa? In some small way, each one of us makes a difference in the lives of another. As it states in our liturgy, "each day, we create a new world".

Adon Olam, Master of the Universe, may we all continue to do the good this congregation began years ago. May we hear the loud call to action as our economic and political climate change and bring justice and hope to those less fortunate than we are.

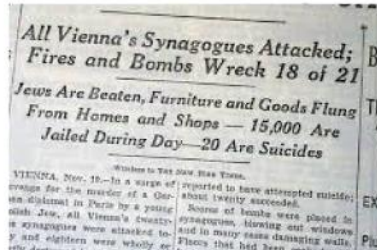


Our guest speaker for this year's program is Dr. Jacob Eisenbach. This will be Dr. Eisenbach's second appearance at our program. To say he can WOW an audience would be a massive understatement.

Although Eisenbach was forced to work in a labor camp that manufactured munitions for the Nazi war machine, he has always maintained a contagious smile, ebullient optimism and a belief that goodness will prevail.

Dr. Eisenbach is 96 years young and worked until four years ago in the dental office in Anaheim Hills, where he practiced for 41 years.

A fine Dentist, Holocaust survivor, captivating speaker and author, his presentation on November 13th is a must. His book, Where You Go, I Go, the story of two brothers clinging together for survival is a fascinating and terrifying page turner. Their family perished in the wrath of the Third Reich. Through it all, Dr. Eisenbach maintained his belief in the ultimate humanity of man and has long since forgiven his Nazi tormentors.



Hear a chilling first hand report of the pain and misery caused when hate is allowed to raise its ugly head.

CBS 'Friends' Re-Unite in NY



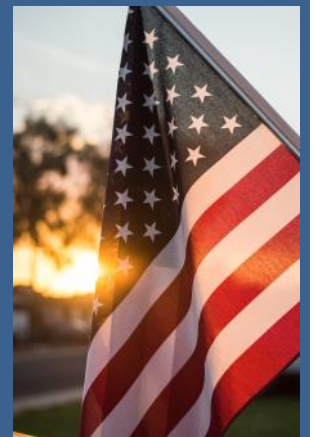

Annually, our little synagogue hosts a very large event that highlights the good deeds of our members as well as community leaders. February 9, 2020 will mark the 14th consecutive year where CBS and the community come together to acknowledge and honor some great individuals. We are featuring our three honorees in monthly newsletter articles to give you a better understanding on who is receiving which award and why.

Last month we featured Kara Lubin, who will be honored with the Shomer Tzedek (Guardian of Righteousness) Award. This month's newsletter article will feature Bob and Kathy Stone, who will receive CBS' Legacy Award for their dedication and involvement in our synagogue and the Jewish community.

Bob, originally from Chicago and Kathy, a San Diego native, met while students at UCLA. They moved to San Francisco where Bob attended UC Hastings School of Law and Kathy finished her degree at San Francisco State. Following Kathy's conversion to Judaism, the two married and shortly after had their first child, Alexander Michael. After Bob graduated and passed the bar exam, he and Kathy moved to Long Beach and Bob joined the firm where he currently practices. Bob is now the sole owner. Their second son, Brian Joseph, was born in Long Beach. The family became members of Temple Beth Zion-Sinai in Lakewood to join Bob's parents before they retired

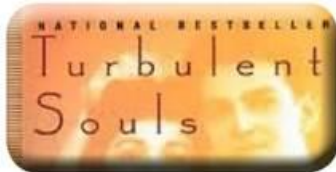

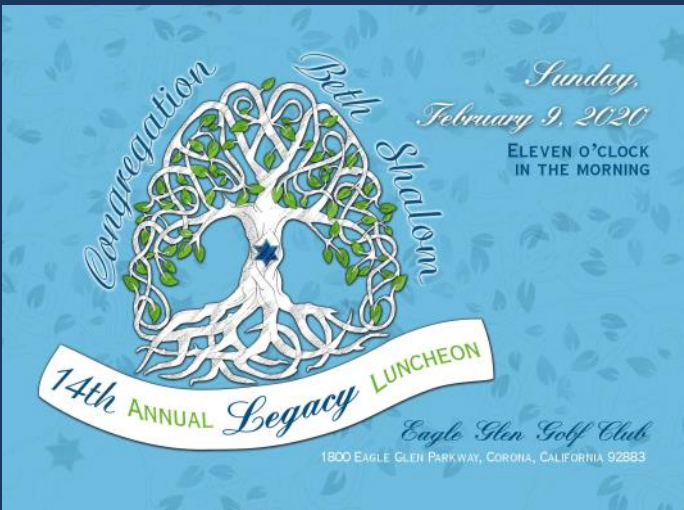

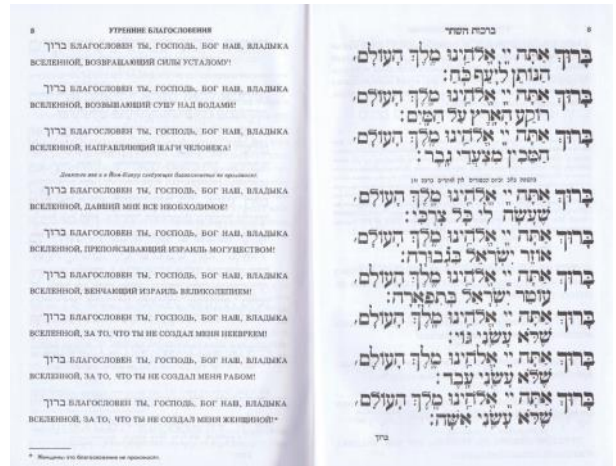
