There is a song by **Foreigner** (1999) that I listened to recently that reminds me of what life can be sometimes.

"In my life there's been heartache and pain

Can't stop now, I've traveled so far, to change this lonely life."

There are events in our life that unite us and divide us. We are at a crossroads in our country where it seems we are divided. But these divides have been there for some time. One of the greatest unifying periods in our country's history was WWII. It was a time when the United States joined a war after a long delay and was eventually attacked. To fight that war and what it stood for, our country became united and people worked together for a common goal.

In the **Torah portion B'Shallach (Exodus 13),** Pharaoh "let the people go". A majority of Israelites were united in their goal of leaving Egypt for a better life and freedom. as individuals and as a community. One of the first actions that they had to deal with was when Pharaoh changed his mind about letting the people go and pursued them into the desert.

The people had come to the Sea of Reeds. Their path was blocked by water. They felt the pressure of their pursuers. They thought it might have been a mistake to have left what they knew, the "comforts" of home, a good meal, a place to stay, a community. Hashem protected them, split the Sea, the people marched forward, the Egyptian army was "crushed" and the Israelites made it to the other side safely. The people witnessed the power of Hashem and sang:

"The Lord is my strength and might; O-zi v'zimrat yah He is become my deliverance. Va'y'hi Li li'yi'shu'a (from the Song at the Sea-Shirat ha-yam)

The Song at the Sea is a "commitment to our faith in Hashem" after viewing the splitting of the sea". It was a unifying moment in the history of our people. But as we continue reading in our Chumash, and like any other people on this planet, we will have times of trouble, "heartache and pain", disunity, and complaining.

What we must remember during times of tumult is that we are here on this earth in the service of Hashem. No, we are not perfect, but we strive to do better for ourselves and in turn mankind.

Adon Olam, Master of the Universe, I quote the lyrics from Foreigner:

"I gotta take a little time, a little time to think things over

I better read between the lines, in case I need it when I'm older

Now this mountain I must climb, feels like the world upon my shoulders

Through the clouds I see love shine, it keeps me warm as life grows colder."

May we be united in our cause(s), come to understand what we stand for as individuals and use the knowledge we have learned for the betterment of humanity. May all of our prayers individually and collectively be answered like the Israelites at the Red Sea while singing praises to **The One!**

## **President's Message**

The baby boom of the post-war years happily resulted in many new young parents. As a matter of course, the South Bronx had its own baby equipment store. Sickser's was located on the corner of Westchester and Fox, and specialized in "everything for the baby," as its slogan ran. The inventory began with cribs, baby carriages, playpens, high chairs, changing tables, and toys.

Mr. Sickser, assisted by his son-in-law Lou Kirshner, ran a profitable business out of the needs of the rapidly-expanding child population. The language of the store was primarily Yiddish, but Sickser's was a place where not only Jewish families, but also many non-Jewish ones, could acquire the necessary paraphernalia for their newly-arrived bundles of joy.

Business was particularly busy one spring day, so much so that Mr. Sickser and his son-in-law could not handle the unexpected throng of customers. Desperate for help, Mr. Sickser ran out of the store and stopped the first youth he spotted on the street.

"Young man," he panted, "how would you like to make a little extra money? I need some help in the store. You want to work a little?"

The tall, lanky African-American boy flashed a toothy smile back. "Yes, sir, I'd like some work."

"Well then, let's get started." The boy followed his new employer into the store.

Mr. Sickser was immediately impressed with the boy's good manners and demeanor. As the days went by and he came again and again to lend his help, Mr. Sickser became increasingly impressed with the youth's diligence, punctuality and readiness to learn. Eventually Mr. Sickser made him a regular employee at the store. It was gratifying to find an employee with an almost soldier-like willingness to perform even the most menial of tasks, and to perform them well.

From the age of 13 until his sophomore year in college, the young man put in from 12-15 hours a week, at 50 to 75 cents an hour. Mostly, he

performed general labor: assembling merchandise, unloading trucks and preparing items for shipments. He seemed, in his quiet way, to appreciate not only the steady employment but the friendly atmosphere Mr. Sickser's store offered. Mr. Sickser learned in time



about their helper's Jamaican origins, and he in turn picked up a good deal of Yiddish. In time, the young man was able to converse fairly well with his employers, and more importantly, with a number of the Jewish customers whose English was not fluent.

At the age of 17, the young man, while still working part-time at Sickser's, began his first semester at City College of New York. He fit in just fine with his, for the most part Jewish, classmates — hardly surprising, considering that he already knew their ways and their language. But the heavy studying in the engineering and later geology courses he chose proved quite challenging. The young man would later recall that Sickser's offered the one stable point in his life those days.

After signing up for an ROTC program and serving two tours of duty in Vietnam, the young man quickly rose to the top ranks of the U.S. military. In 1989, under President George Bush, the "young man" was sworn in as the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

In 1993, two years after he guided the American victory over Iraq in the Gulf War, he visited the Holy Land. Upon meeting Israel's Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir in Jerusalem, he greeted the Israeli with the words Men kent reden Yiddish — "We can speak Yiddish."

As Shamir, stunned, tried to pull himself together, the two-continued chatting in his second-favorite language, which he had never forgotten from his

early days in the Bronx. You know him as our former U.S. Secretary of State —General Colin Powell!



7 Shevat - Moritz Cohen (a/k/a Bela Kuhn), a communist dictator who ruled in Hungary for 133 days, was deposed this date in 1919 CE with the help of Romania and Admiral Nicholas Horthy. As Kuhn was a Jew, all Jews were accused of being communists and about 5,000 were killed. Kuhn fled to Vienna and subsequently tried to launch revolutionary outbreaks in Germany and Austria during the 1920s. Accused of "Trotskyism", he was 'purged' by Stalin in the late 1930s.

Purim is a lot of fun at the Synagogue. It commemorates the time when Jewish people, who lived in Persia, were saved from extermination by the bravery of a young Jewish woman, Queen Esther. The word Purim means lots. The Jews were saved from persecution in the Persian Empire. Haman casts lots to determine when this act would occur.



The celebration of Purim begins with dressing in costume. Many folks dress as characters of the story of Purim. It is a mitzvah to hear the story of Purim. It is chanted from the scroll of Esther called the Megillah. It is traditional to make a loud noise with graggers or noise makers every time Haman's name is mentioned. The holiday includes the giving of treats to friends and family . At our synagogue, our students decorate and put together baskets .

This is a fundraiser for our religious school. Hamentashen is a traditional pastry eaten on Purim. It is a cookie shaped with three corners like Haman's hat. Our baskets include these traditional treats. Our students put together a Purim play for our congregation. This holiday is a lot of fun for everyone.

- 1 lb. (Plain, poppy or sesame is \$5, OR raisin-cinnamon, choc chip, other flavors for \$6)





est-selling author Mitch Albom returns to nonfiction for the first time in more than a decade in this poignant memoir that celebrates Chika, a young Haitian orphan whose short life would forever change his heart. hika Jeune was born three days before the devastating earthquake that decimated Haiti in 2010. She spent her infancy in a landscape of extreme poverty, and when her mother died giving birth to a baby brother, Chika was brought to The Have Faith Haiti Orphanage that Albom operates in Port Au Prince.

Tith no children of their own, the 40-plus children who live, play, and go to school at the orphanage have become family to Mitch and his wife, Janine. Chika's arrival makes a quick impression.

Brave and self-assured, even as a three-year-old, she delights the other kids and teachers. But at age five, Chika is suddenly diagnosed with something a doctor there says "no one in Haiti can help you with."

Itch and Janine bring Chika to Detroit, hopeful that American medical care can soon return her to her homeland. Instead, Chika becomes a permanent part of their household, and their lives, as they embark on a two-year, around-the-world journey to find a cure. As Chika's boundless optimism and humor teach Mitch the joys of caring for a child, he learns that a relationship built on love, no matter what blows it takes, can never be lost. Told in hindsight, and through illuminating conversations with Chika herself, this is Albom at his most poignant and vulnerable. Finding Chika is a celebration of a girl, her adoptive guardians, and the incredible bond they formed a devastatingly beautiful portrait of what it means to be a family, regardless of how it is made.



# Recommended items for a Basic Emergency Supply Kit

Through its Ready Campaign, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. Ready asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other



Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:
Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
Flashlight and extra batteries
First aid kit
Whistle to signal for help
Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation

**Local maps** 

Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities

Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)


