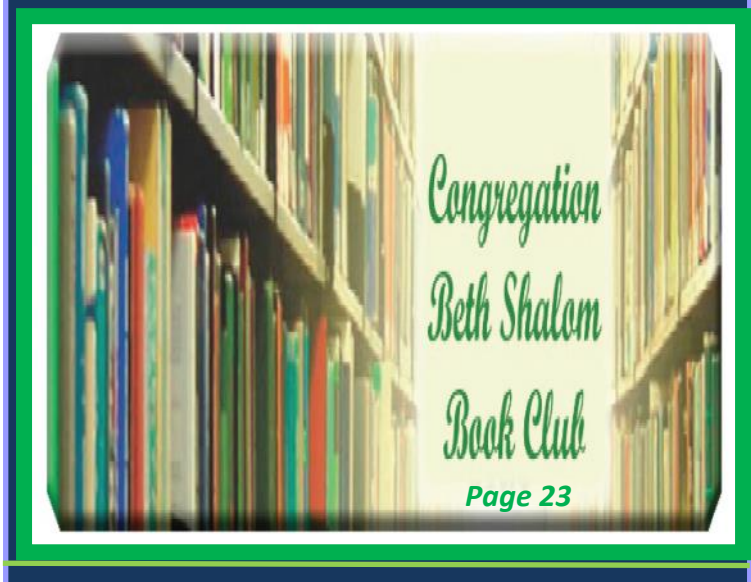

to live in this world." We have rules and laws to live by daily, not only in our secular life, but our Jewish life too!

In the **Parsha Va'Yakhel Pekudei**, artisans come together to build the Mishkan, the Tabernacle, a Holy place for G-d to rest. Details of materials used and directions on how to build it are laid out for the workers. But what does all of this mean to us today?

"The Tabernacle symbolizes the rituals we perform, the ancient melodies we sing, and how we pray. It includes lighting candles on Shabbat and preparing for a Seder. When we do these things, these symbols, we welcome the Presence of Hashem into our homes and hearts. It is another way to say **Shabbat Shalom**."

When we are accountable to ourselves, we think about not only what is best for ourselves, but what is best for others. When we do this, we reach a higher place consciously and in turn, this is what Hashem wants us to do. This is G-d's Living Trust for us! As we exited Egypt, we thought about ourselves leaving a life of slavery, something we were comfortable with for hundreds of years. We are reminded in the Torah, that we were once strangers and that we should look out and care for others as well as ourselves.

We sometimes "need to rekindle our sense of purpose, passion, and service in the details of our own lives" including our jobs and our community. "If we see each new opportunity as a new challenge, if we learn to speak the word **Mitzvah** anytime helping another, we could change the world." We create a new world everyday with our own actions. Think about what a great world we could have if everyone pitched in!

Adon Olam, Master of the Universe, as we head into **Purim**, followed by **Passover**, may we have an order (Seder), and may we provide meaning to the lives of others and ourselves. May we be held accountable financially, physically, and spiritually in this day and age. May we be careful with words and be kind to others and ourselves. Please hear our prayers and give us the strength and the memory that the actions we take remind us that the mitzvot we perform are for You! **Chag Sameach!**

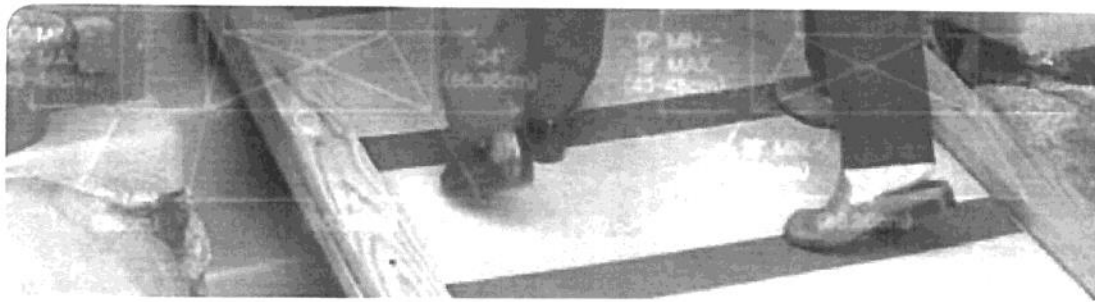

Home Modification

Making Your Home Safer



How you decorate your home reflects your personality and sense of style. In addition to making you feel comfortable, the things in your home can increase your safety or make it more likely that you could fall.

Making changes to your home – also known as home modifications – can make activities easier, improve your health and wellness, and reduce your chances of falling. These changes can include removing hazards, adding supports such as handrails, or changing how or where you do activities. Below are some suggestions to make your home safer:

1. Keep pathways clear

Keep stairs and walkways clear by removing objects that you could trip over. Add storage for things that are usually on the floor, such as shoes or papers.

2. Be aware of uneven surfaces

Look out for changes in the level of flooring, such as in doorways or in between carpeting and tile. Remove throw rugs or use a rug gripper underneath to secure them to the floor. If you can move a rug easily with your foot, you could slip on it.

3. Keep frequently used items close by

Reaching up high or bending down low can cause you to lose balance. For example - in the kitchen, make sure that cooking supplies and other items that you use often are easy to reach.

4. Light your way

Install bright lights, have switches at both ends of stairways, and use night lights to light the path from your bedroom to bathroom. Light switches that glow are easier to see in the dark.

5. Add supports in the bathroom

Bathrooms can be dangerous, especially when things are wet. Put grab bars near the toilet and in the shower. Non-skid strips in the bathtub can keep you from slipping.

6. Stay safe on the stairs

Consider installing handrails on both sides of the stairs. If you already have handrails, be sure you use them. Check that they are properly installed and not loose.

As your abilities change over the years, your home should provide you and your loved ones with the support you need to do your daily activities and the things that you enjoy.

It is difficult to believe spring is in the air. With spring approaching, holiday events are quickly coming our way. March brings many fun activities to our CBS calendar. The first weekend of the month brings us to the annual shabbaton put on by the San Gabriel Valley Jewish Federation. The weekend is being held at Camp Mountain Chai in the Running Springs area. 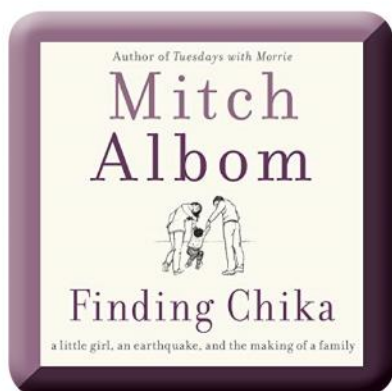

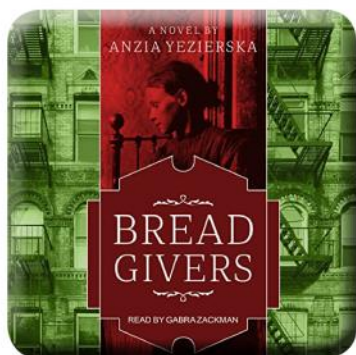
Best-selling author Mitch Albom returns to nonfiction for the first time in more than a decade in this poignant memoir that celebrates Chika, a young Haitian orphan whose short life would forever change his heart.

Chika Jeune was born three days before the devastating earthquake that decimated Haiti in 2010. She spent her infancy in a landscape of extreme poverty, and when her mother died giving birth to a baby brother, Chika was brought to The Have Faith Haiti Orphanage that Albom operates in Port Au Prince.

With no children of their own, the 40-plus children who live, play, and go to school at the orphanage have become family to Mitch and his wife, Janine. Chika's arrival makes a quick impression. Brave and self-assured, even as a three-year-old, she delights the other kids and teachers. But at age five, Chika is suddenly diagnosed with something a doctor there says "no one in Haiti can help you with."

Mitch and Janine bring Chika to Detroit, hopeful that American medical care can soon return her to her homeland. Instead, Chika becomes a permanent part of their household, and their lives, as they embark on a two-year, around-the-world journey to find a cure. As Chika's boundless optimism and humor teach Mitch the joys of caring for a child, he learns that a relationship built on love, no matter what blows it takes, can never be lost. Told in hindsight, and through illuminating conversations with Chika herself, this is Albom at his most poignant and vulnerable. Finding Chika is a celebration of a girl, her adoptive guardians, and the incredible bond they formed - a devastatingly beautiful portrait of what it means to be a family, regardless of how it is made.

Recommended items for a Basic Emergency Supply Kit

Through its **Ready Campaign**, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. **Ready** asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.



Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:



Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation

Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food

Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both

Flashlight and extra batteries

First aid kit

Whistle to signal for help

Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place

Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation

Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities

Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)

Local maps
