President's Message



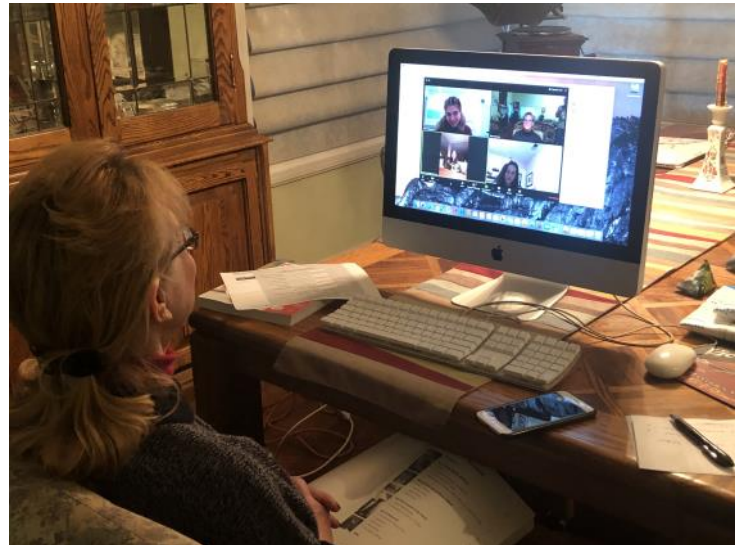

Clean, Sanitize, Disinfect: Another Approach to Combat the Flu

If you have gone to the store lately, you have probably found the household cleaning aisles pretty bare. Don't fret. There's another way to combat the flu without all those chemicals. As many of you know, a few years ago, I was hospitalized for pneumococcal pneumonia. This illness left my lungs quite scarred leaving me unable to use common household cleaners. My doctors showed me another approach to cleaning and disinfecting my home without harsh chemicals.

With the outbreak of COVID19, many of those common cleaners are very hard to find. So, I would like to share my recipes for cleaners and disinfectants that will still protect you and your family from COVID19 and other cold or flu illnesses in case you cannot buy what you need when you need it most.

First, it is important to know the differences between cleaning, sanitizing, and disinfecting. To clean means you are removing dirt and dust. To sanitize means you are reducing, but not eliminating, bacteria and viruses. Finally, to disinfect means to kill all germs. Once you have made any of the recipes, please follow the following procedure for the disinfectants to be most effective:

1. Clean with my multi-purpose cleaner. The reason for cleaning surfaces first, before disinfecting, is because the germs that cause illnesses hide under the dirt. Removing the dirt exposes the bacteria and viruses so the disinfectant can eliminate them.
2. Apply your disinfectant. Pay attention to the "dwell time." Disinfectants need time to kill all the germs. The recommended "dwell time" ensures the disinfectant is killing all the germs. The dwell times for my disinfectant recipes are 2 – 5 minutes.

Once that time has passed, simply wipe off excess with a clean cloth. Your surface is now germ free.

3. If you don't have hand sanitizer, don't worry. Good old-fashioned soap will do the job just as well or better. Just remember to lather up and then, wash in the lather for 20 seconds. The CDC states that singing the "Happy Birthday song" will do it. If you want to go one step better, sing the Shema. You will get your hands clean and have G-d's approval, too.

Natural Multi-purpose Cleaner

1 part white vinegar
1 part water
½ part rubbing alcohol
2-3 drops of dish soap
10 – 30 drops of your favorite essential oil (*If you have granite or marble countertops, do not use lemon essential oil because lemon will damage your stone countertops.*)

Mix together in a spray bottle. Use as you would any other multi-purpose cleaner. It works great on mirrors and glass, too.

Rubbing Alcohol Disinfectant

Mix 1 part water with 1 part rubbing alcohol in a spray bottle. Spray on infected area and allow to dry.

Borax Disinfecting Spray

Besides being an excellent disinfectant, borax kills mold. If you ever have black mold, borax will kill it quickly.
1/3 cup of borax
8 oz. of warm water (not too hot)

Fully dissolve borax in warm water. Then, pour into a spray bottle. Spray on surface and allow to sit for 2 minutes. Wipe off any excess.

Note: Borax is a very potent disinfecting mineral. Some people may have a reaction. Be

careful when using this product. You can find borax in any grocery store where detergents are sold, usually on the bottom shelf.

Lemon Juice and Borax Disinfectant

2 Tbsp. borax
2 cups warm water (not too hot)
¼ cup lemon juice, fully strained with no pulp

Fully dissolve borax in the warm water. Add lemon juice. Pour into spray bottle. Spray on surface and let sit for at least 2 minutes. Wipe off an excess.

If you do not have access to lemons or lemon juice, you may substitute ¼ c. reconstituted lemon juice or 1 tsp. of citric acid. You can find citric acid in any grocery store in the canning aisle. I use *Ball Citric Acid for Preserving Tomatoes*.

Hydrogen Peroxide Disinfectant

Note: Never combine vinegar and hydrogen peroxide together! However, you may clean with my vinegar cleaner, wipe off, then, use the hydrogen peroxide disinfectant for a powerful punch against germs.
1 part hydrogen peroxide
1 part water

Mix together in a spray bottle. Spray on surface. (If using on carpet, check for colorfastness.) Allow to sit for at least 2 minutes. Wipe off excess.

Hydrogen Peroxide Disinfectant is the best disinfectant for pet messes. You may use hydrogen peroxide full strength on pet accidents. When laundering pet beds, blankets and toys, use hydrogen peroxide in your wash cycle to get them smelling super fresh!

So, there you have it. These solutions will get you through the cold and flu season. If you are interested in cleaning solutions for your bathrooms, floors, laundry, or garden weed killer that contain no chemicals, don't hesitate to ask Renée Tieszen.

Recommended items for a Basic Emergency Supply Kit

Through its **Ready Campaign**, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. **Ready** asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.



Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:



Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation

Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food

Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both

Flashlight and extra batteries

First aid kit

Whistle to signal for help

Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place

Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation

Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities

Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)

Local maps

15 Nisan - At midnight, God visited the last of the 10 plagues on the Egyptians, killing all their first-born. Pharaoh's resistance to free us was broken and he virtually chased his former slaves out of the land. 600,000 adult males plus women and children (and a "mixed multitude" of non-Hebrews) left Egypt to begin a 50-day trek to Sinai and our covenantal formation as a nation. The Haggadah Shel Pesach recounts the events of this day.
