47, 48, 49... **Shavuot** is right around the Omer (or counting thereof)! The count began on the 2nd night of Passover and we continue to count towards our goal of 7 weeks or 49 days plus 1 day. This will be our "harvest" for what we had "planted or learned" during Passover and throughout the year.

There are two main reasons why we celebrate Shavuot. The first is to commemorate the Jews receiving the Torah from God at

Mount Sinai, after having been redeemed from Egypt. The second role, which is less prominent in this day and age, is that of a harvest festival. Shavuot used to mark the end of the grain harvest, and Jews would bring **Bikurim** – the first fruits – to the Temple in

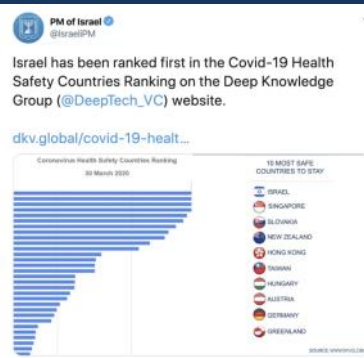
Once this COVID-19 Pandemic subsides, our prayer is for many folks to begin traveling again to Israel.

Jerusalem, as a gift to God. As a reference to this, one of the other names for Shavuot is **Chag Habikurim**. (Jewish Chronicle, May 2017)

Shavuot is also one of the **Shalosh Regalim or 3 Festivals** which include Passover, Shavuot, and Sukkot.

The 49 days between Passover and Shavuot were given as a time to cleanse ourselves. When we made our "Exodus" from Egypt we had changed as a people and were not prepared for the most "monumental of marriages". The Israelites had a slave mentality and had come from an Egyptian secular community after 400 years of servitude. We needed time to acclimate to our new-found freedom! We counted up because each day we grew to a higher level spiritually and we took one step closer in reminding ourselves that we were going to be G-d's chosen nation.

As we continue life during this Pandemic, many of us have reached new challenges in our lives with work, school, and even being quarantined in place. It has been difficult to separate the days one from another. It is like Mitzraim (Egypt, narrow places) again. What obstacles must we overcome to get back on track in our lives, economically, spiritually, and mentally? What new stresses have been added to our lives that we need to "deal" with and overcome? 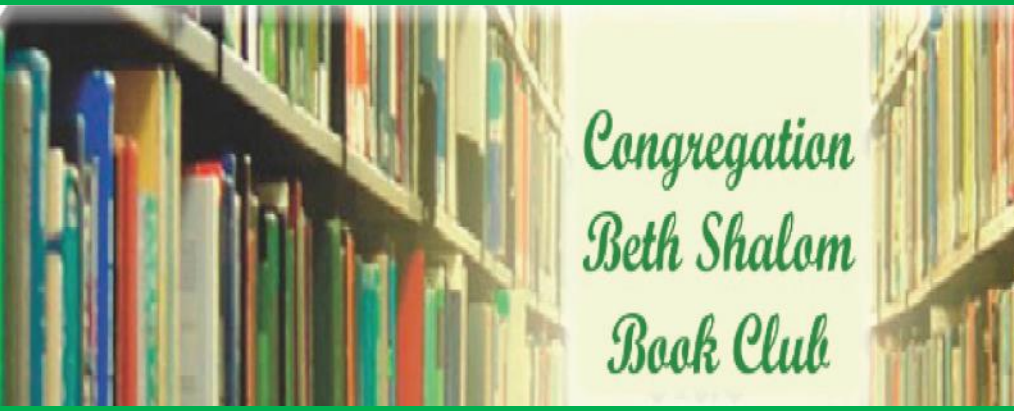
Information on events, meetings and services listed in the CBS newsletter have been changed to video or conference calls for the month of May. Notifications will be sent via email or text accordingly.

June date has not been set; we will be reading *A Rabbi at Sea* by Rabbi Corrine Copnick.

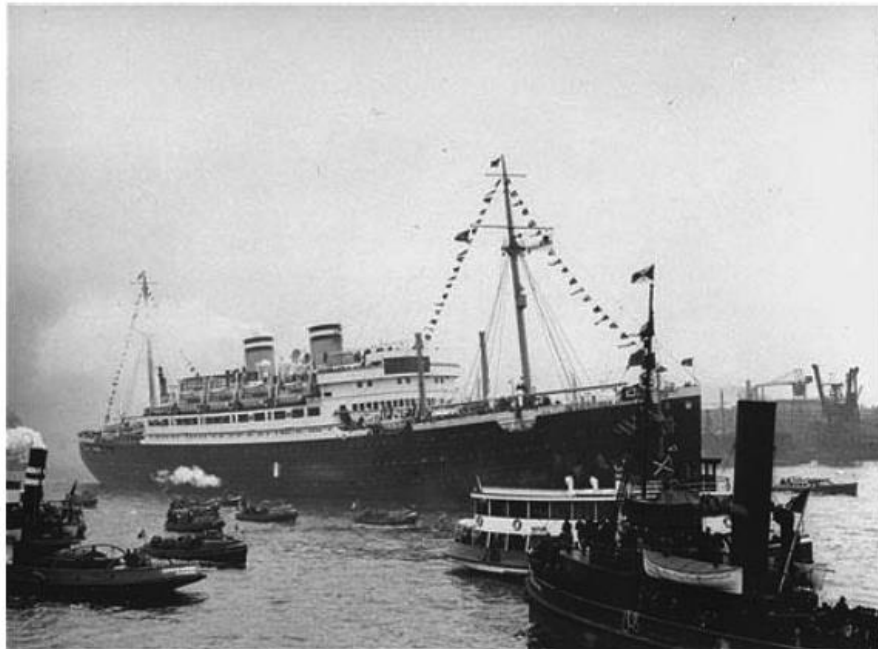

Refused entry to Cuba, Canada, and the USA, they were transported back to Europe. Though Belgium, the Netherlands, the UK and France took some of them, 254 are known to have perished in Nazi concentration/death camps. Self-Checker

A guide to help you make decisions and seek appropriate medical care.

Watch for symptoms

People with COVID-19 have had a wide range of symptoms reported – ranging from mild symptoms to severe illness.

These symptoms may appear **2-14 days after exposure to the virus:**

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Chills
- Repeated shaking with chills
- Muscle pain
- Headache
- Sore throat
- New loss of taste or smell

When to Seek Medical Attention

If you develop **emergency warning signs** for COVID-19 get **medical attention immediately**. Emergency warning signs include:

- Trouble breathing
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
- New confusion or inability to arouse
- Bluish lips or face

*This list is not all inclusive. Please consult your medical provider for any other symptoms that are severe or concerning.

Call 911 if you have a medical emergency: Notify the operator that you have, or think you might have, COVID-19. If possible, put on a cloth face covering before medical help arrives.

Recommended items for a Basic Emergency Supply Kit

Through its **Ready Campaign**, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. **Ready** asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.



Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:



Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation

Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food

Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both

Flashlight and extra batteries

First aid kit

Whistle to signal for help

Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place

Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation

Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities

Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
