Continuing my thoughts from last month about "All Lives Matter" there are many things to consider and much work that can be done. Recently, I was on a Zoom conference with Professor Elliot Dorff, Philosopher, Professor of Philosophy and Ethics at American Jewish University, and an esteemed member of the Rabbinical Assembly Law Review Board (more specifically, he chairs the committee



that determines Jewish Law for the Conservative Movement).

During this one hour call issues of institutional racism, bio-medical issues, quarantine, triage, Shabbat and technology, and finding balance in one's life during this Pandemic were discussed. There is not enough room in my article for all that was covered.

Drs., Rabbi's and "Thinkers" don't have all the answers and they are spending a great deal of time attempting to determine what is ethical and moral for all people. Who gets to be treated first at a hospital?

High Holy Days will bring Days of Prayer for Christians

Coincidence, I don't think so! A movement to bring focus on to G-d and prayers in large groups is being orchestrated by many Christian people.

Organizers usually select the first Thursday in May for the National Day of Prayer. This year with COVID, they have selected Saturday September 26 (Yom Kippur) as their culmination of prayers which start on September 18 (Rosh Hashana). It is a way for them to honor the Jewish People, and becoming better connected to G-d!

White, Black, those with money, or 1st come 1st serve? This is what is being discussed!

There were two points that grabbed my attention.

1st was the challenge of Covid at home. Those with a family and are together 24/7, and those who are alone. There are challenges for both and as a community we can and should help. For those who are alone, in Genesis Chapter 2 it states that "it is not good to be alone". We must as a community do what we can to outreach to those who are at home and/or may be at risk. Bikkur Cholim, visiting or calling the sick on the phone at a minimum should be made to see if those who are alone are in need of basic needs. That action alone includes a connection with the outside world.

Those who are with family 24/7 have unfortunately seen a rise in domestic violence. An important idea was to take care of your body during this Pandemic. While we stay at home during Covid-19 (some are saying the 19 stands for the number of pounds gained during this time!) we should consider our physical health and don't forget to exercise and eat right!

The 2nd idea is that of prayer. Rabbi Dorff made it quite clear that you are not alone if you don't understand all of our prayers. As I have stated many times about prayer is that it is about Praising and Thanking Hashem for all that we have in life, but it is also a way to petition or ask for things from Hashem. However, the concept of praying, is a way for us to connect to the universe. It allows us to "get out of ourselves" and look at our self in a greater context. Like the old Carpenter's song, "Sing, Sing a Song, Sing out loud, Sing out STRONG...".

A person can pray to the One who provides all to mankind, anywhere, any place, any time, in the language you are most comfortable. The more we remind ourselves of this, the better off we will all be!

Remembering Synagogue founder Obby Agins



Obby Agins, founder of CBS was elevated to heaven the end of June 2020. He may not have been a regular attendee at services or events, however, Judaism ran deep in his veins. Evident by his continual financial support and his willingness to host our synagogue for the annual Summer Bash, Obby felt most comfortable with entertaining and schmoozing with others.

In July 1968, a group of Jewish families gathered to have their first Shabbat service. Even then, Obby was more of the behind-the-scenes person, taking a role on the Board. He could always be counted on for financial support and other discussions. The founding name was Temple Beth Sholom, later changing the Temple to Congregation and Sholom to the more present of Shalom. It was Obby, who found the property on 9th and Sheridan Avenue, that soon became the first synagogue for TBS. Throughout the years, Obby was very generous. At his memorial service, Cantor Shapiro eloquently provided a beautiful eulogy and a short story about two Jewish people stranded on an island, one started mapping out ways to be found, while the other one said, relax, I have contributed millions to the synagogue each year. I am confident they will find me! While this seems humorous, it really speaks towards Obby. His regular calls and visits by Marci Rouman or Karen Spiegel provided the needed cash and extra funds to operate our synagogue. Each time we visited, he would ask in his own way, how is the education, how many children are enrolled, and how could he help? Since history seems to be changing, I want to be sure all of our members understand who some of our founders were, and we are

taking this month to feature Obby Agins.

Obby Agins—Story Continues

In 1924, Yetta and Harry Agins came out West from Denver Colorado to start a new life in California. They settled in Corona a very small agriculture town that had some open spaces that a growing family would fit right into. Their family at the time consisted of three children, Leona, Sam and Betty. In 1928 the family had a new addition Albert (Obby).

After another four years brother Ronald (Ron) came along and that finished out the family. Obby attended Jefferson Elementary, Corona Junior High, and Corona High School. Obby joined the Merchant Marines during WWII and that kicked in the desire to travel. He traveled and in 1950 he served during the Korean War. Obby and younger brother Ron, were business partners.

They initially invested in Agins Auto (which was an auto junk yard, but often Obby would state, one person's junk is another person's treasure.) Soon the brothers would invest in property, developing the first model of Mobile Home parks, which expanded throughout many regions. Throughout the years, the Agins brothers made their mark in Corona and the region. Their unique businesses brought interesting outcomes. Obby was most comfortable on his construction equipment.

Often when people found out the owner of the company was on the bulldozer, they just scratched their heads in amazement. The brothers were huge supporters of many organizations, including the Corona Chamber and various charities. Obby was one of the early founding members of Temple Beth Sholom (now Congregation Beth Shalom). He also served as a board member for the synagogue. He was one of the founders of a local bank and was on that board for fifteen years.

Obby is the father of two children, Sandy Brink and Phil Agins. He is the step father to two children, Cheryl Ballou and Kathleen Ballou. He is a grandfather and a great grandfather. During the past several years, Obby was semi-retired and people would see him at this office, when he was not out at the Corona Airport, where he had a hanger and was rebuilding an antique aircraft. He held a pilot's license since he was sixteen. He truly enjoyed flying even if it is just around the sky over Corona. Obby became a fisherman when he was a very young man and has fished from Alaska to the tip of Mexico bringing home salmon, halibut, tuna among other good fish.

Obby enjoyed family get together's gardening, traveling and entertaining families and friends with good meals and stimulating conversation.

Obby passed away in June 2020.



The following month, 23 Jewish refugees arrived from Brazil.

SAFETY FIRST

CBS' Board has approved guidelines from a newly-formed committee, enabling our synagogue to RE-OPEN.

Safety is FIRST and FOREMOST. The guidelines are printed below.

CBS wants you to participate at your own comfort level, whether in person or via the internet. Specific to IN PERSON, a crew of dedicated volunteers have ensured the RE-OPENING exceeded the CDC standards—again SAFETY is our #1 focus.

This deep cleaning will become a common practice that will be done weekly between services and usage of the facility.

SYNAGOGUE POLICIES

In an effort to PROTECT the SAFETY OF ALL please be sure you follow these policies:

- If you do not feel well, have a cough, cold or are ill, please do not come to synagogue.
- Masks are required at all times while at the synagogue, you need to bring your own.
- Yarmulke / head coverings: please bring and wear your own.
- Hand Sanitizer will be available at the doorway when entering the synagogue.
- Other than your immediate family, social distancing will be in place. Please keep at least six feet apart.

Therefore: refrain from hugging, shaking hands, touching other people in any way.

We want to thank you for following these policies, and we ask that each person take precautionary measures to ensure the safety for others.







HOME IMPROVEMENT

Rabbi Corinne Copnick's book, "A Rabbi at Sea" will be a future read and discussion for CBS' Book Club.

What an incredible journey! Born in Montreal, Canada, and now living in Los Angeles near her children and grandchildren, Rabbi Corinne Copnick entered the Academy for Jewish Religion's (AJRCA's) rabbinic program at the age of 73, with a richly developed background. She graduated as an ordained rabbi in 2015, when she was 79. Her earlier career in the arts in Canada spanned national (CBC) radio, television, film, stage, and visual art. In Montreal, as owner/director of Galerie La Magie de L'Art, she created more than 40 stellar exhibitions and a dozen cultural events.

In 1991, in cooperation with the Central Museum of Zagreb and the Jewish Museum in Belgrade, she organized an outstanding international exhibition of Jewish Art Treasures from the former Yugoslavia. It was one of the peak experiences of her life.

In Toronto she directed many plays for both Medina Theatre Theatre and the Jewish Committee of Greater Toronto. For fifteen years, she ran a successful Writing and Editing Service, guiding many books to publication, writing a regular column for Toronto's Jewish Tribune, and serving as Entertainment Editor of Jewish Life. Rabbi Corinne's own literary works include Altar Pieces, screened nationally many times on Canadian TV; Embrace, bilingual (English/French) love poems; and the humorous How To Live Alone Until You Like It...And Then You Are Ready for Somebody Else. Cryo Kid: Drawing a New Map (2008) was awarded finalist status in the 2009 National Indie Awards of Excellence.



A recipient of various grants and scholarships, Rabbi Corinne was honored to serve as resident writer at the Banff Center for the Arts. Funded by government she designed grant, а groundbreaking, role-playing simulation on Canadian unity called Future Directions. An acclaimed play that she wrote for drug education purposes, Metamorphose, was featured at the Quebec Pavilion of Montreal's Man and His World as well as many other venues. The Canadian Commemorative Medal (1992) recognized her substantial contribution to Canada. In 1998, the National Council of Jewish Women (Montreal Section) honored her, with other Past Presidents, as a Woman of Distinction. She has served on the Boards of various community organizations (in Canada, Temple Emmanuel Beth Shalom, The Quebec Drama Festival, and The Jewish Theatre Committee of Greater Toronto, and, in California, West Coast Jewish Theatre and the Canadian Women's Club of L.A.)


Currently, she is working on a new collection of inspirational stories and posting Divrei Torah and other writings regularly on her website www.rabbicorinne.com.

After rabbinic graduation, she initiated an independent, pluralistic house of study, *Beit Kulam*, which celebrates inclusion and is now in its sixth year. As a rabbinic resource and consultant — and a soughtafter storyteller and speaker — she applies artistic modalities to education about Jewish living and to innovative life cycle events. During the last five years, she has also served seven times as Guest Staff Rabbi during Passover and the High Holy Days for the Holland America/Seabourn cruise lines. These lengthy cruises have afforded her the opportunity to explore Jewish life in various parts of the world — and to form "at sea congregations" composed of people from diverse places and religious backgrounds.

With a Canada Medal (C.M., 1992), M.A. (McGill University, Developmental Drama, 1975), and B.A. (McGill, Honors English, 1956) to her credit, and, after an rabbinic internship with Rabbi Mordecai Finley in Los Angeles, Corinne was overjoyed to receive an M.R.S. (AJRCA, Master of Rabbinic Studies, 2015) to signify the completion of her studies. Her thesis topic was "The Staying Power of Hope in the Aggadic Narratives of the Talmud." As an ordained rabbi, she is deeply appreciative of all those who have guided her journey.



Rabbi Corinne is a trained Dayan (judge in a rabbinic court for conversion), serving at the Sandra Caplan Community Bet Din in Los Angeles, and also serves on the Board of Governors of the SCCBD.



Through its Ready Campaign, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. **Ready** asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses. All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.
