Erika Schwartz (z"l) truly was a Woman of Valor. **She impacted the lives of many people**. Erika was married for over 65 years to her beloved Nick (z"l) (Nicky as she fondly referred to her husband). They were absolutely "Hamish" people!

Hoshana Rabbah, Shemini Azteret, Simchat Torah, Hanukkah, Tu B'Shvat, Passover, Shavuot, Tisha B'av, and other fasts and minor days that come at the same time over and over again.

After Sukkot, we go back to the Why is this important? "beginning" of the Torah and read **B'Reishit** (Genesis). This also tells us that the New Month is coming! So, what happened "in the beginning"? It is our "creation" poem. It reminds us to "reflect on the miracle of creation" because we ourselves are part of that creation! As part of the creation story, we are tasked with taking care of a world that cannot be replaced. This is part of the problem. How do we do that? Who gets to make the decisions?

The answer and insight into these and other questions are in our The Torah requests of us to go in the "right" direction. Part of that direction is to remember that we are here to serve Hashem. Our job (so to speak) is to make the world a better place by helping others and in turn we are serving The One. We only have one life to do such things. Each day is given to us to renew ourselves, to grow our faith in Hashem and humanity, and to find ourselves eager to do good deeds and in turn, serve Hashem.

Erika and Nick Schwartz (of blessed memory) were founders of Congregation Beth Shalom, and are being honored by Congregation Beth Shalom (2007) with the first Legacy Award.

A beautiful memory, which will forever be in my mind, was when Eileen and I worked on outreach and education to High School students. It was when the movie, "Schindler's List" was released. Erika agreed to address High School students after watching the movie at the Edwards Cinema (at the time located on Rincon Avenue). Thousands of high school students sat on the edge of their chairs as she shared her horrific upbringing during the war.

Many of these High School Students sent hand written notes of appreciation, and we realized the thousands of lives Erika impacted.

Both Erika and Nick (of blessed memory) were always offering people assistance and guidance

in business practices, synagogue issues, and family life. They both were leaders, mentors and dear friends—and yes, family! Grateful seems so trite when referring to all they represent, and the assistance they offered.

I cannot recall a single time when Erika raised her voice, or that I saw her mad. She was truly one of a kind.

She exemplifies what 'the greatest generation' is all about.

ROSH HASHANAH EVENING: 5781.... OPENING REMARKS BY CANTOR BRUCE SHAPIRO

This has been "a year". Right? If this past year has not helped you define who you are as a person, as a Human Being, as a Jew, well... keep on your journey! I have received so many emails this past year. So much junk email comes my way. Buy this, buy that, vote this party, this guy is no good, this guy is good, fires, weather, climate change, global cooling, global warming, home schooling, Zoom, Social Distancing, wear a mask, don't wear a mask, will there be a vaccine? I can make you a millionaire! POTUS and SCOTUS. Will peace break out?

This past year starting in February, has been a confusing year to say the least. Wouldn't you agree? We seem more divided than ever, yet somehow, I feel closer. To my family. To our community through Zoom. Shabbat services on Zoom are not horrible...I've even stayed after a few times and played some regular music on my guitar! I'm closer to my co-workers. To my driver at Grub Hub! I've called you (many of you, not all). Since Elul was a time to ask for forgiveness, I ask that if I have offended any of you...please, please, please forgive me! If I have, I want to talk to you personally, one on one. I did not mean to. I hope not to do that behavior that was not right or hurt you. I will try to do better this coming year.



We cannot live the lives we have without the men and women of our country defending the very freedoms we have as American Jews.

Deep down, I am Zionist. AS if you could not tell, I love Israel. I love what Israel stands for. I love what it has accomplished in the last 72 years. I






In 2009, at the age of 23, Deborah Feldman packed up her young son and their few possessions and walked away from her insular Hasidic roots. She was determined to forge a better life for herself, away from the rampant oppression, abuse, and isolation of her Satmar upbringing in Williamsburg, Brooklyn. Out of her experience came the incendiary, best-selling memoir Unorthodox, and now, just a few years later, Feldman has embarked on a triumphant journey of self-discovery - a journey in which she begins life anew as a single mother, an independent woman, and a religious refugee.

Taking her cues from favorite childhood books read in secret and the modern classics only recently introduced to her, Feldman explores the United States, from San Francisco to Chicago, New Orleans, and the Southwest. In her travels, and at home, Feldman redefines her sense of identity - no longer Orthodox, she comes to terms with her Jewishness

by discovering a world of like-minded outcasts and misfits committed to self-acceptance and healing. Inwardly, Feldman has navigated remarkable experiences: raising her son in the "real" world, finding solace and solitude in a writing career, and searching for love.



For fans of All the Light We Cannot See and Orphan Train, the author of the "thought-provoking" and "must-read" novel The Gilded Years crafts a captivating tale of three young people divided by the horrors of World War II and their journey back to one another.

During the turbulent months following the 1941 bombing of Pearl Harbor, 21-year-old Emi Kato, the daughter of a Japanese diplomat, is locked behind barbed wire in a Texas internment camp. She feels hopeless until she meets handsome young Christian Lange, whose German-born parents were wrongfully arrested for un-American activities. Together they live as prisoners with thousands of other German and Japanese families but discover that love can bloom in even the bleakest circumstances.

When Emi and her mother are abruptly sent back to Japan, Christian enlists in the United States Army, with his sights set on the Pacific front - and, he hopes, a reunion with Emi,

unaware that her first love, Leo Hartmann, the son of wealthy of Austrian parents and now a Jewish refugee in Shanghai, may still have her heart.

Fearful of bombings in Tokyo, Emi's parents send her to a remote resort town in the mountains, where many in the foreign community have fled. Cut off from her family, struggling with growing depression and hunger, Emi repeatedly risks her life to help keep her community safe - all while wondering if the two men she loves are still alive.

As Christian Lange struggles to adapt to life as a soldier, his unit pushes its way from the South Pacific to Okinawa, where one of the bloodiest battles of World War II awaits them.

Flung together by war, passion, and extraordinary acts of selflessness, the paths of these three remarkable young people will collide as the fighting on the Pacific front crescendos. With her "elegant and extremely gratifying" (USA Today) storytelling, Karin Tanabe paints a stunning portrait of a turning point in history.

love its creativity, its history, its soul. What it stands for in the middle of the desert surrounded by enemies (less today than last week). When I went to Camp Tel Yehudah, in Barryville, NY, in the Borscht Belt on the Delaware Gap between NY, NJ, and PA, little did I know what impact that experience would have for me and now for you over 45 years later!

In regard to Black Lives Matter. Here we enter a political scenario, which I am not prepared to delve into on this pulpit. I was taught at Yeshiva to not talk politics from the Bimah and I have adhered to this credo since I came to you 11 years ago. But, in telling you who I am, I do believe that all lives matter. That one group should not step on another to lift itself up without helping the people they are stepping on to get up too. We are all important. As Martin Luther King Jr. said in one of his speeches, "I look to a day when people will not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character."

During the holidays, I would like you to explore who

you are and what you stand for in the world. Take the time to review your year and what you can do to make it better next year. We must remember the white spaces in the Torah. You know the white spaces in the Torah between the letters. This is where you tell your story. What would your character have done if you were that character?

Teddy Roosevelt said the following, "Nobody cares how much you know, until they know how much you care."

Adon Olam, Master of the Universe, during this High Holiday of knowing oneself, knowing what we are defiant about, what we stand for, and what we are willing to "go to the mat" for, give us the wisdom, the knowledge, and courage to face the world with a positive attitude and an open mind!

Safety is **FIRST** and **FOREMOST**. The guidelines are printed here.

CBS wants you to participate at your own comfort level, whether in person or via the internet.

Specific to IN PERSON, a crew of dedicated volunteers have **RE-OPENING** ensured the exceeded the CDC standards again SAFETY is our #1 focus.

Deep cleaning the synagogue is a common-practice that is done before and after services and at other times the facilities are used.

In an effort to PROTECT the SAFETY OF ALL please be sure you follow these policies:

Tanya (the overachiever that she is) walked the entire Half-Marathon within 2 days, before work!





Recommended items for a Basic Emergency Supply Kit

Through its Ready Campaign, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. Ready asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.



$ \mathcal{Q} $	Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:
	Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
	Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
	Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
	Flashlight and extra batteries
	First aid kit
	Whistle to signal for help
	Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
	Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
	Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
	Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
	Local maps


