Cantor's Corner by Cantor Bruce Shapiro

A few weeks ago, I was thinking about **Simchat Torah**? You might ask, but Cantor, Simchat Torah was months ago. It's almost **Hanukah** and shouldn't you be focusing on that?



Great question, but let me tell you why I was in that space with Simchat Torah. In November, we had no Jewish holidays and I was way behind in my reading from October! I was reading an article about Simchat Torah on the Aish.com website (The Oldest Love Affair in Jewish History, by Jeff Jacoby). As I read the article it actually reminded me of our journey from the beginning of Elul until now, almost Hanukah, a rededication of oneself, the true meaning of Hanukah. At Simchat Torah we begin the Torah all over again. We rededicate ourselves to looking at the Torah which provides us with quidance on how we live.

The Jewish people have survived all the destruction, anti-Semitism, wars, defeats, pogroms, expulsions, military defeats, and much more. How? Simply, the Torah is what binds us all together. The late **Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks** stated the following, "That book is our most cherished possession. We stand in its presence as if it were a king. We dance with it as if it were a bride. We kiss it as if it were a friend. If, God forbid, one is damaged beyond repair, we mourn it as if it were a member of the family."

Some of us know more about the Torah than others. Some of you can read Hebrew, others not so well. It does not matter where you are on the spectrum of Judaism. Whatever happens to you, to me, to us, we have the book, the Torah, the instructions to life, how to live, and how not to live to guide us.

In the Koran the "people of the book" as we are called are mentioned 31 times. It may have been put there for emphasis. Our book, its stories, and the people are important. We sometimes take it for granted. We sometimes don't pay enough attention to it, when we know we should. Whatever it is that is keeping you away from it, remember, that our people, the Jewish people, have survived these millennia in good times and bad, because of the Torah.

As we approach Hanukah, the rededication of the Temple holiday after the amazing victory of the Maccabi's over the Greeks, what course of action will you take in our community to make it a better place while you "have the time" or "make the time" to do so?

Our Shul building is closed again. It is our intention to do everything possible to stay connected as best we can as long as this Pandemic goes on. This is a tough time for all of us, especially those who are shut in. This is the part of the community family we should consider reaching out to more frequently.

I am asking you to PLEASE call a CBS member you do not know well, and just say hello. Introduce yourself. It does not have to be a long conversation. Show someone you care. Every call makes a difference in that person's life and yours! I am also asking you to come on Zoom on a Friday night. "A BIT OF CHANUKAH BACKGROUND"

The Customs of Chanukah

On each of the eight days of Chanukah feelings of gratitude are expressed through special prayers, and the lights of the Chanukiah are lit each evening. It is also customary during the holiday for members of the family to play dreidel, give presents, and eat delicacies such as latkes.

The Chanukah menorah, or Chanukiyah, holds eight candles, one for each day the oil burned in the ancient Temple. An additional candle, the shamash, is used to light the other candles. It may be part of the Chanukiah (usually higher or slightly separate from the others), or in a separate holder next to the Chanukiah. Some Jews prefer to use oil and wicks. Each member of the family should have his/her own Chanukiyah. While electric Chanukiyot acceptable as a religious decoration, they should not take the place of either candles or oil. Since this is a holiday in which our pride in heritage is demonstrated, the candles should be displayed in a window facing a public area. The light of the candles should not be used for any other purpose, and we are to use the shamash only to light all other candles. Candles are usually lit in the early evening upon seeing the first stars, though they may be lit later. Candles are placed in the chanukiyah from right to left, and are lit by the shamash from left to right. On the first evening one candle is lit, on the second evening two candles are lit, and so on. On Friday evening, the Chanukah candles are lit before the Shabbat candles.

Historical Background of Chanukah

One hundred years after Alexander the Great's conquest of the Persian Empire in 333 BCE, Antiochus III added the Land of Israel to his empire. His successor Antiochus Epiphanes IV began a ruthless policy to destroy the Jewish religion. He was determined to force the Jews into idolatry and to accept the Hellenistic way of life. Chanukah commemorates the victory of the Maccabees over the Greeks. A small band of rebels was led by Mattathias, a High Priest and the head of Hasmonean family in the mall village of Modiin. Upon his death, the leadership of this band of fighters was passed to his third son, Judah. overcoming what After insurmountable odds, Judah and his followers achieved victory.

The festival also celebrates the purification and rededication of the defiled Temple in Jerusalem, and the restoration of service to God, hence the name Chanukah which means "dedication."

While cleansing the Temple, it was found that there was not enough oil for the High Priest to use in the week long ritual. Only one small jug of oil, sufficient for one day, was found but it miraculously lasted for eight days (by which time a fresh supply of pure oil was obtained). Hence, Chanukah is popularly known as the Festival of Lights.

Festival of 'Lights' or 'Light'?

Chanukah has commonly been called "The Festival of Lights" referring to the flames kindled on each night. Yet we can also drop the letter "s" and think of Chanukah as the victory of the forces of "light", which include faith and lovalty to the Jewish tradition and the will to fight for these beliefs, over the forces of "darkness", represented by the hedonistic lifestyle of the ancient Greeks. According to the Kabbalists, the "light" of Chanukah is the "Ohr HaGanuz", one of highest the emanations hidden away during Creation, to be revealed at the proper time.

Encouraging Education

The word Chanukah has two meanings: "inauguration" and "education". It became customary for community officials to gather during Chanukah and to prescribe ways of enhancing Torah study among Jewish youth.

The custom of giving Chanukah "gelt" (money) to the children grew, and by extension, the custom of giving presents on Chanukah has also become fashionable.

Let us all remember while we are giving presents to friends and family during the holiday season the Mitzvah of Tzedakah.

Please ensure that you set aside some percentage of holiday spending to worthy

MAKING LEMONADE FROM LEMONS!!



During these uncertain times of COVID, the leadership at Congregation Beth Shalom continues to work diligently in finding solutions to ongoing challenges.




Congregation Beth Shalom has a beautiful **Simcha Board**, called the *Tree of Life*, on display as you enter the synagogue lobby.

Potato Latkes – Recipe from Sisterhood of Temple Shalom in Dallas, Texas, Tested and verified by Joan Zak

Feeds 4:

Ingredients:

2 lbs grated potatoes (hash brown mix doesn't work – too soggy)

½ lb. grated onion

4 Tbsp. Matzoh Meal

1 large beaten egg

1/4 tsp. white pepper

½ tsp. salt

 $\frac{1}{4}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ cup oil for frying

Drain potatoes and onions, add meal and seasoning. Taste to see if more salt or pepper is needed. Add egg. In heavy skillet, place oil about ¼ inch deep and heat until a water droplet sizzles when placed in the pan. Drop by tablespoonfuls into the skillet and flatten. Cook on medium high heat until golden, turning as necessary. Drain on paper towels.

Recommended items for a Basic Emergency Supply Kit

Through its *Ready* Campaign, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. *Ready* asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.



Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:
Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
Flashlight and extra batteries
First aid kit
Whistle to signal for help
Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)


