For example, this month we begin a new book in the Chumash – Shemot. The first Torah reading is Shemot, followed by Va'era . We just finished a survival course on creation of the world, dealing with our family relationships and drama, getting along with strangers and G-d. Now, in this new section of The Book, we as a family (70 of us to start) need to continue to survive in Egypt. Anyone see anything good here yet, except that we get to stay together as a family? Oh, yeah, our family has grown exponentially!

There is a new sheriff (Pharaoh) in town who did not know Joseph. The issue that this new leader saw was that the population of our people had overgrown in relationship to the rest of the population there. The Pharaoh objects not so much to their behavior but to their very existence. They were a small part of the entire population, however their numbers and their power were blown out of proportion. Does this sound familiar?

Anti-Semitism has been around for centuries. In Shemot (1:10), "Let us deal shrewdly with them, so that they may not increase; otherwise in the event of war they join our enemies in fighting against us and rise from the ground." The problem continued to grow for the Egyptians because the more oppression that was thrown at the Israelites, the more they increased. There is a direct relationship between a harder life and the "bitter herbs" we eat on Passover!

This goes back to a discussion we had earlier. The tougher things get for Jews, the more united we become. The more united we are, the stronger we are as a people.

#### How synagogues and churches have dealt with the pandemic



President's Message By Bruce Rouman

On the first night of Hanukkah, hundreds of people show up at Temple Micah for a latke cooking competition. Families bring their menorahs, light candles, feast on potato pancakes, award prizes and sing.

It should come as no surprise, as the Coronavirus pandemic rages, that this year's celebration will be virtual.

"We'll have some people demonstrating latke cooking online," Rabbi Adam Morris said. "I envision the Zoom screen with all the Hanukkah lights lit."

Our CBS version of the menorah lighting was on Zoom, but those who participated enjoyed seeing the many menorahs at members' homes. Just look at the photos in this newsletter.

For communities of faith, Covid-19 has upended traditions and placed annual festivities at churches and synagogues on hold, forcing rabbis, pastors and priests to reimagine Christmas and Hanukkah celebrations and rethink their messages to the faithful.

"I think my basic message is that we don't have control," said David Thatcher, a priest at Holy Transfiguration of Christ Orthodox Cathedral. "We have certain delusions as Americans that we have control of all of this stuff. Any catastrophe, any cataclysmic event in our lives, and our hope is in our God."

With cases surging across the U.S., the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has issued strict guidelines for gathering in houses of worship. At those still offering in-person services, instead of hundreds of people in sanctuaries, there are only dozens, and they must socially distance and wear masks.

Almost 300,000 people in the U.S. have died from Covid-19, and their loved ones are mourning, tingeing the holiday season with sadness and loss, faith leaders said.

"It's easy for me to say look on the bright side," said Rabbi Evette Lutman of B'nai Havurah. "We're experiencing all kinds of grief, all kinds of loss. The worst thing you can do when you're experiencing grief is to whitewash it over and say, 'I'm fine with that, and let's move on.'"

Lutman, who held this year's Hanukkah songfest on Zoom, said she tries to help members make some sense of these trying times.

"How sad it would be if we missed this unique place and time to recognize the opportunity to make the world better," she said, "to use the wound as an opportunity to heal."

Morris, the rabbi at Temple Micah, likened this holiday season to a chocolate chip cookie without the chocolate chips — it can still taste good, but it's not the same.

"It's been lacking that kind of unspoken quality of what you can do with a touch or a glance or where you feel spirit," he said. "When you have a room of people singing together, there's something happening. We've missed that."

Not all churches have been willing to accept government restrictions on gatherings. Two churches in the Denver suburbs, Community Baptist Church and Denver Bible Church, sued the state to continue worshipping indoors.

A federal judge ruled in their favor in October, saying the state cannot force congregants to wear masks or limit gatherings. The following month, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that restrictions on capacity at houses of worship and religious events are unconstitutional.

Colorado conceded this month that the high court's decision made it unlikely that the state could enforce restrictions.

A survey by Parade Magazine and the Cleveland Clinic indicated that just 9 percent of those surveyed said they planned to attend holiday services this year, down from 2017, when the Pew Research Center found that more than half of those surveyed said they would go to church on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

The Rev. Martin Lally, a priest who has led Holy Family Catholic Church in Denver for

eight years, said 300 people normally pack his church on Christmas, with more spilling out the doors. The sanctuary would be adorned with Christmas trees, poinsettias and garlands and red bows on the railings.

This year, only 50 people will be allowed inside, and the children's pageant and the Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Masses will be prerecorded to watch on YouTube or Facebook. If nothing else, he said, the pandemic has taught people perseverance: "The message of the Scriptures is 'Hang in there, God is with us.'"

At Temple Micah, Morris will convey a similar idea.

"We're just trying to be present and help people feel connected," he said. "To me, that's where God is. Keep on keeping on. We have what we need to bring meaning to each other, to bring compassion to our world. Keep on keeping on."

Many churches and synagogues have gone along with the flow, especially for the High Holy Days and now for Christmas services. Instead, they will be virtual, with a new camera and audio systems.

"The big traditions that people are used to being able to see or experience or participate in, we're

going to be doing that still in these services, but do them in a way, best we can, knowing that people aren't in the room with us," Adams said.

The church distributed kits to congregants containing candles, song lyrics and a script for the service. The livestream will include a chat feature, allowing people to engage with the ministers and one another. And when it comes to Holy Communion, most anything goes.

"We just encourage folks to use whatever they have at home," Adams said. "If you have bread and juice, that's great. If you have tortilla chips and water or soda, that's up to you. The Holy Spirit can move in whatever your elements are. God's grace is still present."

At CBS, leadership is working on ways to continue to keep our congregants safe, and will provide services via Zoom. When we are permitted to meet in person, we will welcome our members who wish to join us in person. Zoom Services will continue to be available for our members who prefer to participate from home.



### Congregation Beth Shalom Book Club

The Beauty Queen of Jerusalem is a dazzling novel of mothers and daughters, stories told and untold, and the binds that tie four generations of women.

abriela's mother Luna is the most beautiful woman in all of Jerusalem, though her famed beauty and charm seem to be reserved for everyone but her daughter. Ever since Gabriela can remember, she and Luna have struggled to connect. But when tragedy strikes, Gabriela senses there's more to her mother than painted nails and lips.

Desperate to understand their relationship, Gabriela pieces together the stories of her family's previous generations—from Great-Grandmother Mercada the renowned healer, to Grandma Rosa who cleaned houses for the English, to Luna who had the nicest legs in Jerusalem. But as she uncovers secrets, forbidden romances, and the family curse that links the women together, Gabriela must face a past and present far more

complex than she ever imagined.

Set against the Golden Age of Hollywood, the dark days of World War II, and the swingin' '70s, The Beauty Queen of Jerusalem follows generations of unforgettable women as they forge their own paths through times of dramatic change. With great humor and heart, Sarit Yishai-Levi has given us a powerful story of love and forgiveness—and the unexpected and enchanting places we find each.

first novel sets the youthful ordeals of Maya, an idealistic and somewhat imperceptive American student at Israel's Hebrew University, against both the historical and contemporary struggles of Western Jews. The "sealed room" of the title refers both to the gas-proofed area in Israeli homes created during the Gulf War and to Maya's uneducated heart. Her Israeli relatives Tami and Nachum, with their soldier-son Dov and daughter Ariela, offer domestic comfort as they struggle with the reticent Dov, who has recently lost an Army buddy. Shortly after her arrival in Jerusalem, Maya moves in with Gil, a passionate artist who was discharged from the Army under a cloud. She becomes the submissive recipient of his love and of his sudden, violent rages. Meantime, a neighbor, disoriented Holocaust survivor Shifra Feldstein (something of a mystic), believes Maya to be a kind of savior and presents her with gifts and cryptic messages. Along the way, the story



is occasionally interrupted by Shifra's grief-clouded ruminations on the course of her life, though the verbal drift of her musings deprives them of much solid resonance. Maya goes camping with Dov and his friends, is beaten and raped by Gil, and receives word of her mother's impending death from cancer. Shifra's own sudden demise precedes Maya's return to America, where her mother reminisces, then becomes reconciled with her daughter, in the process clarifying some of the emotions and experiences Shifra had shared with her. Maya returns to Israel, dumps Gil, and vows to try to see Israel as it really is. The portrait of Maya is compelling, and her confusions and doubts are persuasive, but comparing her experiences with dangerous boyfriends and an ill mother to the Palestinian peace talks is a stretch. The tale doesn't need, and can't sustain, the larger geopolitical and historical implications that are added to it.

CBS wants you to participate at your own comfort level, whether in person or via the internet.

Specific to IN PERSON, a crew of dedicated volunteers have ensured the RE-OPENING exceeded the CDC standards— again SAFETY is our #1 focus.

Deep cleaning the synagogue is done before services and at other times the facilities are used. In an effort to PROTECT the SAFETY OF ALL please be sure you follow these policies:

- 1. If you do not feel well, have a cough, cold or are ill, please do not come to synagogue.
- 2. Masks are required at all times while at the synagogue, you need to bring your own. If you don't have one, we can offer a single-use mask, compliments of a generous donation from CBS Members Paula and Mark Fogel.
- 3. Yarmulke / head coverings: please bring and wear your own.
- 4. Hand Sanitizer will be available at the entrance of the synagogue. Please use when entering.
- 5. Other than your immediate family, social distancing will be in place. Please keep at least six feet apart.

Therefore: refrain from hugging, shaking hands, touching other people in any way.

6. We want to thank you for following these policies, and we ask that each person take precautionary measures to ensure the safety of others.

### SOCIALLY DISTANCED READY FOR IN-PERSON SERVICES

A huge thank you to Mark & Gail Koren for preparing the Synagogue according to CDC recommendations for Social Distance requirements—each row has been spaced 6 feet apart. Each chair has been thoroughly sanitized and will be done each week between services and events held at the Synagogue.

CDC guidelines allow families to sit together, and at the recent services, this photo shows families and attendees complying with these guidelines. # **Recommended items for a Basic Emergency Supply Kit**

Through its Ready Campaign, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. *Ready* asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.

#### Recommended Items to Include in **Basic Emergency Supply Kit:**

Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days. for drinking and sanitation

Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food

Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both

Flashlight and extra batteries

First aid kit

Whistle to signal for help

Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place

Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation

Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities

Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)

Local maps


