The weekend of February **19 and 20**, we read **Parasha T'Rumah**, which refers to "that which is set aside by its owner and dedicated for sacred use". The root of the word means to "elevate". We read about the building of the Tabernacle the Israelites are to construct for Hashem. We are all caught up in the news of the day, the Pandemic, and politics. **Take a break from it all!** This Torah portion builds on previous readings to remind us about maintaining and integrating the observance of **Sacred Time** (Shabbat and Holy Days), **Sacred Space** (right now, Shul on Zoom with our community), and **Sacred Deeds** (Ma'asim Tovim) into our lives.

What's a Bagel Without Cream Cheese

Now here's a topic I've never looked into and that is the price of a bagel with cream cheese. Based on the name of this article, we'll look at New York pricing which, despite the extra competition is higher than Southern California. Let's get started in the science of Bagelnomics....

Whether you were born deep in Brooklyn or moved to the city last month, "just a schmear" connotes a sense of taste and discernment. It's the custom of a citywide society of bagel connoisseurs.

For the uninitiated, "just a schmear" is what you tell your bagel guy when he's about to slap a half pound of cream cheese on your bagel. "Just a schmear" means no, I'd like less than a quarter inch slab of cream cheese for breakfast. Because just a thin schmear is all a bagel really needs.

The New York bagel shops are notoriously generous with their cream cheese. But you pay dearly for it: adding cream cheese doubles—or more—the cost of your bagel. That's true even if you ask for only a schmear; there's no discount for being kind to your cholesterol levels.

The bagelnomics add up. If you bought a bagel with cream cheese every day for a whole year, that's something on the order of \$800. There must be a cheaper way to get your cream cheese fix. After all, bagel shops will gladly sell you a half pound of cream cheese to spread yourself, a handy feature for setting up bagel brunch spreads at home. So what if you bought your cream cheese on the side and spread it on yourself? Would you save or lose

money by doing so?

At most bagel shops the bagel's and cream cheese's weights were pretty consistent, making it easy to take averages of each shop's typical schmears.

Each bagel costs anywhere from \$1.80 -



\$3 and cream cheese prices range from \$4 to \$6 per half-pound

From these numbers we were able to calculate some interesting values: the premium you pay for ordering cream cheese on your bagel, how many bagel's worth of schmears there are in a half pound of cream cheese, and how that price premium compares to buying cream cheese separately and schmearing an equal amount on a bagel yourself.*

* We assume that you'd schmear on just as much as the bagel shop so we can isolate the premium you pay for having the service rendered in-store.

The best idea may to buy bagels by the dozen and buy cream cheese and you do the work. That could be a savings of 61 cents a bagel, or \$2.64 for every half pound of cream cheese.

Thus if you bought a bagel from the bagel shop every day for a year and spread your own cream cheese, you'd save a whopping \$221.12. And that's if you schmear on a regulation amount of cream cheese - which is usually too much. Schmear on less and the savings keep multiplying.

A schmear's weight can't predict your total savings, but if you consider a cream cheese price premium of 100% (\$1.50 for a plain

bagel, vs. \$3 for a bagel and a schmear) even considering the higher price of the shop's cream cheese, your per-bagel savings for schmearing your own cream cheese are nearly a dollar. At a local Noahs or Einstein Bagels - a bagel with cream cheese is \$2.75.

There's only one pattern that predicts how much you stand to gain or lose by ordering cream cheese on the side: this is called the price per schmear, or the price of a shop's half pound of cream cheese divided by the number of bagels it can schmear. That is, the higher your price per schmear, the less you generally save by adding cream cheese on your own.

Go over a buck and you're likely better off ordering cream cheese on your bagel, but if the price per schmear is lower than a dollar, you may be better off ordering your cream cheese on the side.

But the real reason to care about price per schmear is the bigger point it illustrates about buying cream cheese separately: it allows you to fully capitalize on only ordering "just a schmear."

Finding a good bagel anywhere is hard enough



as it is. Finding one that won't try to kill your cholesterol levels with a fistful of cream cheese is even harder. So if you only want a schmear with your breakfast, take things into your own hands.

But don't get tempted to look at the other side of the menu... a NOVA LOX SANDWICH with

Cucumber, Tomato, Red Onion, Capers with Plain Shmear on Plain Bagel.

DID YOU KNOW...

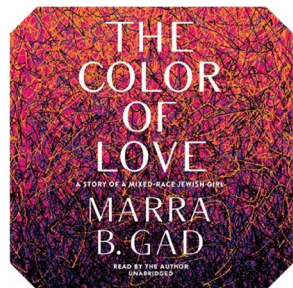
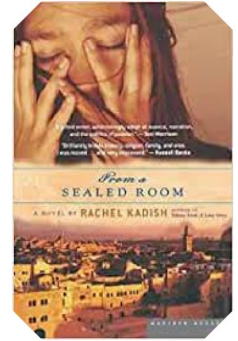
The Jewish Star of David symbol also referred to as Magen David, contains all 24 letters of the Hebrew Alphabet. There is no such thing in any other language.

A first novel sets the youthful ordeals of Maya, an idealistic and somewhat imperceptive American student at Israel’s Hebrew University, against both the historical and contemporary struggles of Western Jews. The “sealed room” of the title refers both to the gas-proofed area in Israeli homes created during the Gulf War and to Maya’s uneducated heart. Her Israeli relatives Tami and Nachum, with their soldier-son Dov and daughter Ariela, offer domestic comfort as they struggle with the reticent Dov, who has recently lost an Army buddy. Shortly after her arrival in Jerusalem, Maya moves in with Gil, a passionate artist who was discharged from the Army under a cloud. She becomes the submissive recipient of his love and of his sudden, violent rages. Meantime, a neighbor, disoriented Holocaust survivor Shifra Feldstein (something of a mystic), believes Maya to be a kind of savior and presents her with gifts and cryptic messages. Along the way, the story is occasionally interrupted by Shifra’s grief-clouded ruminations on the course of her life, though the verbal drift of her musings deprives them of much solid resonance. Maya goes camping with Dov and his friends, is beaten and raped by Gil, and receives word of her mother’s impending death from cancer. Shifra’s own sudden demise precedes Maya’s return to America, where her mother reminisces, then becomes reconciled with her daughter, in the process clarifying some of the emotions and experiences Shifra had shared with her. Maya returns to Israel, dumps Gil, and vows to try to see Israel as it really is.

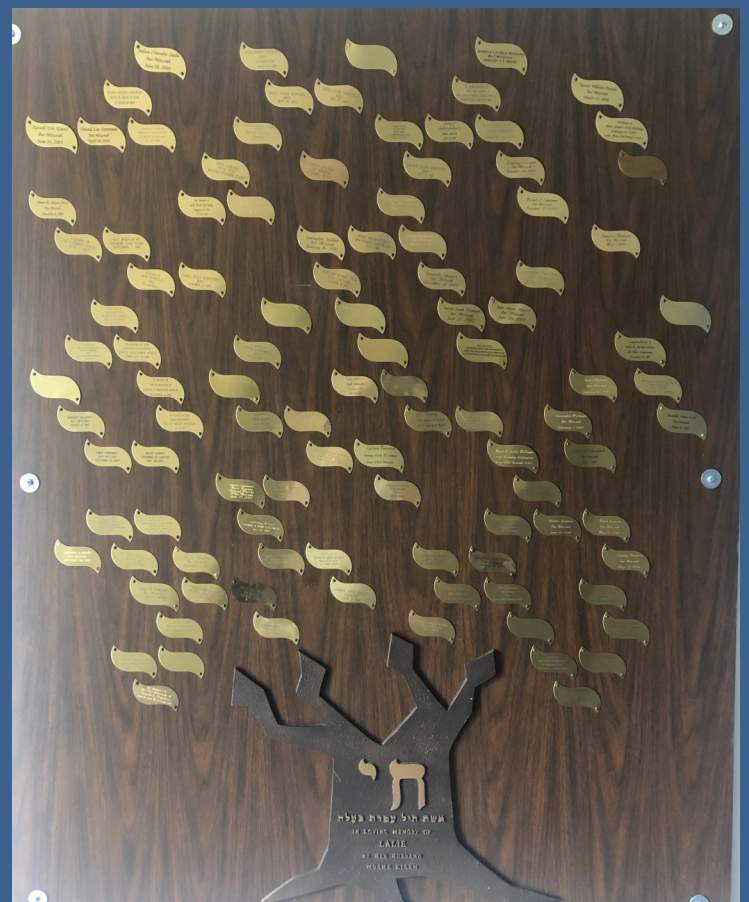
Simcha Board Tree of Life

Recommended items for a Basic Emergency Supply Kit

Through its **Ready Campaign**, the Federal Emergency Management Agency educates and empowers Americans to take some simple steps to prepare for an respond to potential emergencies, including natural disasters and terrorist attacks. **Ready** asks individuals to do three key things: get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan and be informed about the different type of emergencies that could occur and their appropriate responses.

All Americans should have some basic supplies on hand in order to survive for at least three days if an emergency occurs. To the right side, is a listing of some basic items that every emergency supply kit should include. However, it is important that individuals review this list and consider where they live and the unique needs of their family in order to create an emergency supply kit that will meet these needs. Individuals should also consider having at least two emergency supply kits, one full kit at home and a smaller portable kits in their workplace, vehicle or other places they spend time.



Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:



Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation

Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food

Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both

Flashlight and extra batteries

First aid kit

Whistle to signal for help

Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place

Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation

Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities

Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
