The New Year is upon us!**

As we leave the mournful month of July behind us with the fast of Tammuz and Tisha B'Av, we head towards happier and more introspective times in the month of Elul which includes **Selichot** (August 28, after Shabbat)!

When is the last time you heard anyone say the following?

"I am running early and I thought we could get a head start on our activities for the day."

It's rare, but this year the month of Elul calls to us earlier than the norm. This is about as early an Elul that I can remember. After Elul comes **Rosh Hashanah** (Tishrei) which is right after Labor Day.

We begin to prepare ourselves for the upcoming **Ten Days of Repentance**. We do this “early” to give ourselves the opportunity to prepare in advance of Rosh Hashanah. Selichot is an expression of eagerness to begin the process of repentance.

HIGH HOLY DAYS ARE HERE AGAIN!

Just when you thought the Labor Day holiday signaled an end to summer, we start up our Erev Rosh HaShanah services. Yes, Monday, September 6 at 7 PM our services begin. And even a week before will be S'lichot.

Last year was a mess, with COVID-19 in full swing, and we learned to adjust to Zoom services. With just a handful of support crew, Cantor Bruce Shapiro managed to organize home-based readers on computers. You could have never imagined clergy of all religious faiths using computers as a way to continue the message of faith. I suppose we decided to creatively learn to bend a little to make it happen.

Our doors were basically shut to all except 3-4 people helping the Cantor keep the computer show "on-the-air". Nevertheless, it worked...and yes the entire year worked – who would have ever thought this would happen. Look what we had to invent, Torah readers at home, several Rabbis giving us a sermon from their home offices, and Cantor Shapiro with a mask...and we knew it wasn't Purim.

Now it's almost September 2021, and we still have masks, hand sanitizer and there's still services on Zoom. We just can't get rid of the trappings of COVID-19. This year in alignment our vaccination policy, masks will no longer be required at services & events for fully vaccinated individuals. Sol arrived after a very strict approval process. Mandatory quarantine is 14 days. It can be shortened by appeal to 10. Sol was released after only 12 hours by proving he had COVID antibodies. COPS and CLERGY by Joan Zak

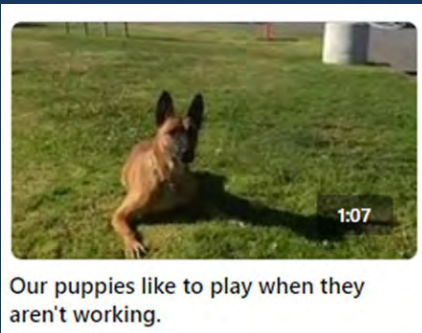

My first meetings centered around work with a group called CityNet, which provides services for homeless people. Then, they showed us a police department helicopter and have discussed the various community programs in which the police are engaged. I encourage you to visit their Facebook page <https://www.facebook.com/CoronaPD/> to learn more about their community programs, either to participate, or, perhaps, bring back to your community.

Each quarter a different church, mosque or other religious institution hosts the meeting. The last meeting was held at the Police Department. Often the host will give a tour of the facility to anyone who is interested. I estimate about five people from the hosting location usually attend the meeting.

On Wednesday, August 11th at 8:00 in the morning (yawn!) we will be hosting the program here at CBS. Paula Fogel has graciously accepted an invitation to provide cookies, cake loaves and muffins for a continental breakfast and we will also serve bagels and lox (or we couldn't call ourselves Jewish!).

Representatives from many of the churches and the mosque in the Corona area will come to this meeting and all of our members are welcome to attend. It's always interesting and I thank anyone that is willing to help me make the Corona Clergy people and the police folks who join us feel welcome and comfortable. Safety and Security Update by Joan K. Jacobs

CBS continues to be open for services, activities and events for all members and guests both in the synagogue and simultaneously on Zoom.

1. We will continue to sit socially distanced in the sanctuary.
2. Face masks are encouraged indoors because of the increasing number of new COVID-19 cases in or near our community.
3. The front door is locked 15 minutes after services begin. If you arrive when the door is locked, please ring the bell for admittance.
4. Remember that MOST, but not ALL, of our congregants have been fully vaccinated for COVID-19. Continue to take precautions, as needed, for your own personal health.
5. There is a possibility that some or all scheduled events listed in this Newsletter may be cancelled or postponed due the Delta Variant of Coronavirus. 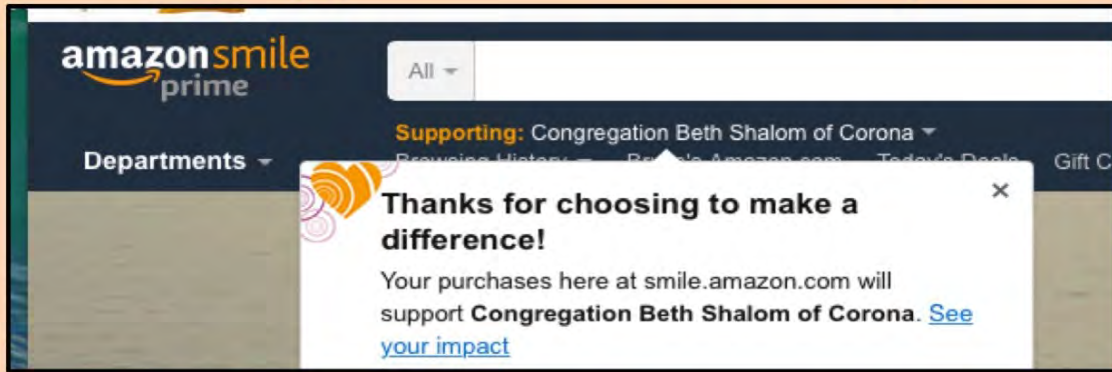

Pull Together: Make a Difference

Shortly before California's COVID-19 lockdown, I had collected the pull tabs for the Ronald McDonald House. Little did I know that I would be storing those tabs for the next 18 months. Happily, the Inland Empire Ronald McDonald House has begun accepting pull tabs again even though visitors are still not allowed inside the House.

The staff immediately remembered me as the liaison for "the little shul that can." The staff wish to extend their sincerest gratitude for our contributions for the cause – pulling together to make a difference. They said that many organizations like the



Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, have contributed, but they are delighted how such a small group is so dedicated to the cause and can generate so many tabs. I told them that the generous efforts of one young man, R.J. Spiegel, and his family are responsible for the greatest contribution as I raised the bag of pull tabs given

to me from R.J. Of the 16,411 pull tabs donated this time, 9,378 of them were in R.J.'s bag!

I hope everyone will recommence the collection of the pull tabs. Remember, pull tabs are on many canned goods beside soda cans. Those tabs from tuna, canned fruit, pet food, soup cans, energy drinks or anything with a metallic tab are valuable. It takes about 1,128 tabs to make a pound. They make about \$.50 a pound. Last year the House had 1,806 families stay during their time of need as their children received medical assistance at the Children's Hospital of the Loma Linda University Medical Center. Those pull tabs help defray the cost of housing.

To share this painful part of my life is to reveal a period where I lost my family, was victimized, hunted and left without power over my life. To talk about it exposes me at my lowest. But as I look back today, I realize I did have power and I used it to stay alive. In telling my entire story, I no longer feel a victim's shame and instead know I have made proud my parents, sisters and the Jews of Wieliczka, Poland." Nathan Poremba.

Food for Thought: Something Different with That Leftover Challah

begins. As the celebrating winds down, there on its silver platter is the shell of what’s left of the Challah. Sometimes someone will say, “I’ll take it to make French toast,” or, another may say, “Oh, there’s enough for a nice bread pudding.” But what happens to that poor Challah that has nothing to offer but its crusty exterior? Leave it to

Jewish cooks to bake something delectable out of those crusty leftovers. Sephardic Jews are the known masters of pastries made from leftover Challah and that crusty exterior is no exception. Try one of these delectable cookies for yourself before tossing that Challah crust in the nearest garbage pail. Shabbat Shalom!

Mexican Almond Cookies

by Renée Ryan-Tieszen

(From *A Drizzle of Honey: The Lives and Recipes of Spain’s Secret Jews*, by David M. Gitlitz & Linda Kay Davidson)

Ingredients

- ¾ c. almonds
- ¾ c. walnuts, chopped
- ½ c. sesame seeds
- ¼ c. honey
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- ½ tsp. almond extract
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- ¼ tsp. cloves
- ½ c. finely ground Challah crusty exterior

Directions

1. Finely grind the nuts and sesame seeds together in a food processor.
2. Heat the honey in a medium saucepan over medium heat until it foams. Turn off the heat. When the foam has subsided, fold in the nut mixture.
3. When it has cooled so that it is warm to the touch, stir in the beaten eggs, almond extract, spices, and bread crumbs.
4. Preheat the oven to 325°F. Grease and flour two cookie sheets. Using a teaspoon, drop the batter onto the prepared cookie sheets, at least 1 ½” apart.
5. Bake until lightly browned, about 20-25 minutes. Let the cookies cool on the cookie sheets until firm. Remove them to a plate.
6. Repeat with the remaining batter. Store the cookies in a tightly covered container. *Makes 36 cookies.*

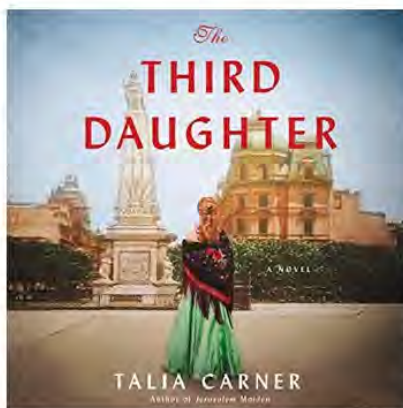

While the feisty Esther Kaminsky understands her obligations, her artistic talent inspires her to secretly explore worlds outside her religion, to dream of studying in Paris - and to believe that God has a special destiny for her. When tragedy strikes her family, Esther views it as a warning from an angry God and suppresses her desires in order to become an obedient "Jerusalem Maiden."



But when a surprising opportunity forces itself on to her preordained path, Esther finds her beliefs clashing dangerously with the passions she has staved off her entire life - forcing her to confront the most difficult and damning question of all: To whom must she be true, God or herself?

Feeling like a princess in a fairytale, Batya leaves her old life behind as she is whisked away to a new world. But soon, she discovers that she's entered a waking nightmare. Her new "husband" does indeed bring her to America: Buenos Aires, a vibrant, growing city in which prostitution is not only legal but deeply embedded in the culture. And now Batya is one of thousands of women tricked and sold into a brothel.

As the years pass, Batya forms deep bonds with her "sisters" in the house as well as some men who are both kind and cruel. Through it all, she holds onto one dream: to bring her family to America, where they will be safe from the anti-Semitism that plagues Russia. Just as Batya is becoming a known tango dancer, she gets an unexpected but dangerous opportunity - to help bring down the criminal network that has enslaved so many young women and has been instrumental in developing Buenos Aires into a major metropolis.

A powerful story of finding courage in the face of danger, and hope in the face of despair, *The Third Daughter* brings to life a dark period of Jewish history and gives a voice to victims whose truth deserves to finally be told.
