agriculture to industrialization to service industries. People moved from the countryside to the city. People moved! While we move, we often are moved to aid others.

We know well enough in the **Book of Genesis** that family dynamics and relationships are the main topic. We can all learn a great deal from these many chapters about sibling rivalry, love, hate, ignorance, truth, treatment of one another, and compassion.

Remember, there are 2 sides to every story. In Va'yeishev on the one hand, "Reuben is the protector and Joseph is sold to the Midianites and on the other, Judah comes to the rescue of his brother stopping him from being killed as he suggests the sale to the Ishmaelites." Two versions of the same story woven together for "political purposes" speaking to two different segments of the population.

The **S'fat Emet** said the following: "Often we despair that the good deeds we have done have made no difference, when in fact they have made a great difference."

As we approach Hanukah and rededicate our lives to greater care in this world, may we all remember to do so with a joyous heart!

## President's Message Interesting Jewish Sites

On our recent vacation, we visited many places of local interest. It is always interesting to find Jewish sites, such as synagogues, the Jewish Quarter, or other historical settings.

On this trip to Rome, we took a hop-on hop-off bus which dropped us off within walking distance of the Jewish Quarter in Rome. The Great Synagogue of Rome (Tempio Maggiore di Roma) is the largest synagogue in Rome. The synagogue was actually closed to the public due to Simchat Torah services taking place. This building was built in 1904 and is surrounded by fencing for security and plaques telling of the history in Rome. Private tours of the Synagogue and the Jewish Museums are available and must be arranged directly with the Jewish Museum Office.

The Jewish ghetto of Rome or the Jewish Quarter is where you can see this synagogue. You can walk to many shops and various Jewish restaurants. At the dawn of October 16, 1943, the Nazis surrounded the neighborhood and captured over 1,000 Jewish people from their homes. Two days later the prisoners were loaded onto a train bound for Auschwitz: of the 1,023 deportees only 16 survived the extermination.







On our trip to Israel we saw some synagogues in Tzfat (Safed), Israel.

The Ari Sephardic Synagogue

Down by the cemetery there is another synagogue, Eliyahu HaNavi, the oldest synagogue in Safed that historical sources tell us existed as early as 1522.

### Abuhav Synagogue

The synagogue is named after the fifteenth century kabbalist, Rabbi Isaac Abuhav, who is considered one of the great sages of Castile, Spain.

According to tradition, Rabbi Abuhav designed the synagogue and his disciples erected the building in Safed when they



The synagogue almost was completely destroyed in 1837 the earthquake. Only the southern wall containing arks the remained standing and exists today of remnant original the building. The rebuilt facility is in full operation

today.







## The Peki'in Synagogue

The synagogue is located in the center of <u>Peki'in</u>, in Northern Israel. The current building was erected in 1873, on the site of older ones. Local tradition holds that it has two stones taken from the walls of the Jewish Temple in Jerusalem built into its walls.



The synagogue is kept by Margalit Zinati, born 1931, who is a member of a Jewish family who has lived for centuries in Peki'in, reportedly since the time of the Second Temple. Margalit Zinati is the last Jewish woman in Peki'in, and she still walks the streets near her home.

### Kahal Shalom Synagogue in Rhodes, Greece

The Kahal Shalom is the oldest Jewish synagogue in Greece, and the sole remaining synagogue on the Island of Rhodes used for services. There has been a Jewish presence in Rhodes for 2,300 years.

There were once six synagogues and prayer halls in the Jewish



Quarter (called "La Juderia"). The Kahal Shalom is located on Dossiadou and Simiou Streets and is believed to have been built in the year 1577. The full name of the building is "Kahal Kadosh Shalom" (Holy Congregation of Peace). It is used for prayer services when visitors or former residents and their families visit the Island for Friday night prayer services, High Holiday services and for special occasions.



The Museum contains a 400 year old Torah amongst other Synagogue artifacts.

The walls of the museum depict the history of the Holocaust and those taken from the community. When the Italian Fascist government fell, the Island came under direct German control in 1943, and more than 1,550 of the remaining 1,700 Jews were deported and met their deaths in concentration camps, largely putting an end to the use of Kahal Shalom. Kahal Shalom was only one of the four synagogues in La Juderia at the time to survive the bombing during the Second World War. Today, Kahal Shalom is used for services months during the summer months, when there is an influx of Jewish tourists and when families of former residents visit for high Holy Day Services and for special occasions. There

As the granddaughter of Holocaust Survivors, it is my personal goal to help educate and share the stories! This horrific time in our history needs to be shared, hopefully to prevent future incidents that led up to the beginning of World War II. I was fortunate to know both of my grandparents who survived WWII. Flora 'Oma' (z"l) and Herb 'Opa' (z"l) had shared their stories, and today, their bodies are gone, but their stories remain for others to listen and learn. In fact, many of our early members were Holocaust

Survivors. It is a tradition for our synagogue to pay tribute to everyone who lost loved ones in the Holocaust.

In November 2021, Zophia Lindenbaum became a Bat Mitzvah. Her grandmother, and Penny greatgrandmother. Faigla



attended. It was then, during the celebration, we learned of another Holocaust Survivor. Our synagogue has successfully provided a community program to share stories of Holocaust Survivors, and we immediately thought how wonderful it would be to have Faigla share her story. Faigla lives in New Jersey, and costs for travel and accommodations were adding up, and basically looking bleak. We found a City of Corona grant for non-profits that Joan Jacobs, Renee Miller, Bruce Rouman and Joan's daughter, Lisa Gesson, worked on and was awarded to CBS fo fund the Kristallnacht Program.

Congregation Beth Shalom is pleased to honor the Silver Dollar Pancake House and its owners Robert and Diana Hernandez, with the Business Partner (Shatuf Tzedek) Award. The award is presented to a business that has made a significant contribution to the Jewish community in the greater Corona area. This award will be presented to Robert and Diana Hernandez at CBS' 16th Annual Legacy Luncheon and Awards Recognition event that will take place Sunday, April 23, 2023, at Eagle Glen Golf Club.

Also being honored that day are CBS Legacy Award recipients Paula and Mark Fogel and Joan Zak and Dennis Brooks. Katie Moore of ABC Hopes will receive the Shomer Tzedek (Guardian of Righteousness) Award. What follows is an article about **The** Silver Dollar Pancake House and how the family built their Hernandez business into one of Corona's favorite eateries.

The Silver Dollar Pancake House (The Pancake House) is an icon in the Corona community and has been labeled the oldest restaurant in the city. Owners Robert and Diana Hernandez and their daughter Jennifer have this operated well-established restaurant since 1990. The Pancake House had several name changes prior to Robert buying the property with the restaurant making its debut in the 1930's. In addition to running a successful restaurant. The Hernandez family is known for helping others in the Corona



community; by assisting non-profit organizations and the homeless.

Robert Hernandez was December 29, 1962, in Corona, California. His parents, Barbara and Cipriano Hernandez, were also born in Corona. Robert's grandfather, Cipriano Senior, was the first Hispanic school board member for The Corona-Norco Unified School District. Robert is the oldest child of three boys and

attended Lincoln Alternative School. He was part of the Mentally Gifted Minors (MGM) program. Robert attended Corona then Junior High, now known as Fundamental Corona Intermediate School (CFIS) and then went on to attend Corona High School. Robert has always been a

hard worker and in 1975, at the age of thirteen. Robert began working at *The Pancake House* as a dishwasher. He was hired by the then-owner, Roland Ossko. Soon, Robert became a line cook and then, by the age of eighteen, he became the kitchen manager.



Interestingly enough, Robert was almost fired by Ossko for being too slow. The position at The Pancake House allowed Robert to cultivate a strong work ethic and provided him with the skills and knowledge to run a business. Robert and Diana met in high school and married in 1984. They welcomed their daughter, Jennifer and in 1987, Little Robert was born. Robert and Diana then went on to buy the restaurant when Robert was 28 years old and became official owners on October 31, 1990. Three years later, there was a devastating fire and the restaurant suffered significant smoke damage. This closed the restaurant for 18 months for an extensive remodel. There was another fire in 2004 but this rebuild did not last as long as the first fire's rebuild Robert and Diana because had previous experience in remodeling and had help with insurance funding. Throughout the years, The Pancake House has been awarded many accolades. Robert Hernandez has worked hard to make a name for himself in the city of Corona. He has been the Cinco De Mayo Grand Marshall and has been awarded several life time achievement awards from community organizations.

In October of 2020, Robert was diagnosed with colon cancer and since surgery,

has been cancer-free. The following year, Robert was diagnosed with dermatomyositis, an inflammatory disease marked by muscle weakness and skin rash. The onset of this disease caused Robert to become paralyzed from neck down with frequent hospitalizations. In early 2022, Robert spent time in a rehabilitation center learning to walk and eat again; having to rebuild all the muscles in his body. His dedication to learning and coming back to work at the restaurant has kept Robert motivated. As of November of 2022, he is back to working at The Pancake House every week.

Robert still uses many of the same recipes that he learned in 1976 and doesn't plan on changing anything. The Hernandez family's perseverance is a testament to the their commitment to making their business an enduring success.



## My D'RASH by Joan Zak, Friday evening, November 25

In the Torah portion this week, we learn that Isaac loved Esau because his game was in his mouth, but Rebecca loved Jacob. ("His game was in his mouth" means that Esau knew how to trap his father with his words. Editor)

This got me to thinking about the relationship of parents to children. As an only child, I didn't have to share my parents with siblings, so I was the most loved, but also the most criticized. I was glad I had a boy, because I was afraid that if I had a girl, I would expect her to be like me. Some of our parents were more insistent than others regarding what we should like and do. I just finished a book by Jeanette McCurdy, a child star, whose mother so emotionally, physically, and sexually abused her that she was totally convinced that she could only be and do what her mother wanted.


When we are young, I think most of us try to please our parents. Our teenage rebellion years are designed to help us get to a healthier distance from them and become self-reliant. While most of us succeed at this on the outside — I went to college 1,000 miles away from my parents and married when I was 18, how many of us fail at this on this on the inside?

My hero, Simon Sinek writes in his book *Leaders Eat Last* that the hormone Oxytocin, which is what enables us to bond with each other, is released when parents feel pride in and get pleasure from the accomplishments of their children. Similarly, we release Oxytocin when we know we have accomplishments that meet or exceed the expectations our parents or other authority figures place on us.

Chabad gives us an interesting commentary on the relationship between Abraham and Isaac. It says "When one met Yitzchak and complimented him for being a *tzaddik* and a great Torah scholar, Yitzchak would modestly, respond: "I am really insignificant. The only great thing about me is that I am the son of a great father, Avraham."

When one praised Avraham for his stature and greatness, he would respond: "All this is insignificant. The only important thing is that I have a son such as Yitzchak."

I've often been reluctant to say I was "proud" of my son Daniel. Rather I say I am impressed by him.



To me, pride indicates that I had something to do with it. Rather, I believe he developed most of his skills and great personality (no, I'm not biased) on his own, and the best thing I did for him was stay out of his way.

Most traditional commentators go out of their way to

villainize Esau – who eventually became Edom because he was red and was a name for the Romans – those arch-enemies of the Jews!

A commentator, Chaim Ozer Shulman actually found something good to say about Esau. Isaac loved Esau because Esau was so zealous in honoring him. A Midrash says Our teacher Shimon Ben Gamliel stated: "All of my days I served my father, and I didn't accomplish even 1/100th of the degree to which Esau honored his father. When Esau served his father, he served him wearing royal garments."

Shulman states that nothing can make a tzadik happier than watching his or her progeny continue in the ways of his forebears, and living a life fully committed to Hashem and Torah. The word I want to focus on here, though, is watch – when our children are grown, unless they ask our advice, our role is to sit back and love them no matter what and not try to intervene in their daily lives. Yesterday at dinner, Dennis' daughter admonished her 18-year old son to eat more dinner or not get dessert! I mean, Seriously?

But what about when our children don't turn out the way we want, and let's face it they never turn out completely the way we want. As I keep saying, I wanted my son to marry a nice Jewish girl, and instead, he will marry a nice Asian boy!

Rabbi Sacks gave, I think, a much more satisfactory commentary. He said:

Isaac loved Esau because Esau was his son, and that is what parents do. They love their children unconditionally. That does not mean that Isaac could not see the faults in Esau's character.

To take seriously the idea, central to Judaism, that our God is first and foremost our parent, is to invest our relationship with God with the most profound emotions. God wrestles with us, as does a parent with a child. We wrestle with God as a child does with their parents. The relationship is sometimes tense, conflictual, even painful, yet what gives it depth is the knowledge that it is unbreakable. Whatever happens, a parent is still a parent, and a child is still a child.


Perhaps that is what Isaac was signaling to all generations by his continuing love for Esau, so unlike him, so different in and destiny, yet never rejected by him. Unconditional love is not uncritical, but it is unbreakable. That is how we should love our children - for it is how God loves us.
